

Dear Parents/Carers,

Thank you to all those parents that supported us with having to close the Reception bubble on Thursday. As I am sure you are aware, this action was taken in line with Government Guidance (see below) in order to restrict/prevent the transmission of the COVID virus.

When an individual develops COVID-19 symptoms or has a positive test

Pupils, staff and other adults must not come into the school if:

they have one or more <u>COVID-19 symptoms</u>

a member of their household (including someone in **their** <u>support bubble</u> or <u>childcare bubble</u> if they have one) has COVID-19 symptoms

they are legally required to guarantine, having recently visited countries outside the Common Travel Area

they have had a positive test

have been in close contact with someone who tests positive for COVID-19

They must immediately cease to attend and not attend for at least 10 days from the day after:

the start of their symptoms

the test date if they did not have any symptoms but have had a positive LFD or PCR test (if an LFD test is taken first, and a PCR test is then taken within 2 days of the positive lateral flow test, and is negative, it overrides the LFD test and the pupil can return to school) You must follow this process and ensure everyone onsite or visiting is aware of it.

If anyone in your school develops a new and continuous cough or a high temperature, or has a loss of, or change in, their normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia), you must:

send them home to begin isolation - the isolation period includes the day the symptoms started and the next 10 full days advise them to follow the <u>guidance for households with possible or confirmed COVID-19 infection</u>

advise them to <u>arrange to have a test</u> as soon as possible to see if they have COVID-19

Other members of their household (including any siblings and members of their support or childcare bubble if they have one) should selfisolate. Their isolation period includes the day symptoms started for the first passen in their household, or the day their test was taken if

isolate. Their isolation period includes the day symptoms started for the first person in their household, or the day their test was taken if they did not have symptoms, whether this was a <u>Lateral Flow Device (LFD) or Polymerase Chain Reaction (PCR) test</u>), and the next 10 full days. It remains essential that anyone who gets a positive result from an LFD result self-isolates immediately, as must other members of their household, while they get a confirmatory PCR test.

If a member of the household starts to display symptoms while self-isolating they will need to restart the 10-day isolation period and book a test.

If anyone tests positive whilst not experiencing symptoms, but develops symptoms during the isolation period, they must restart the 10-day isolation period from the day they developed symptoms.

As a staff we are extremely disappointed that we have to take this course, but if it reduces the number of cases and the potential tragic consequences, then we must recognise its validity. Remote learning will be provided for the children who are self-isolating up to their return on the 12th July.

We would like to thank the vast majority of parents who took this difficult news in their stride. Please remember to carry out a PCR test for your Reception child so that you can identify if you and those living with you are required to isolate. If your child has a positive test result or displays symptoms, please inform the school office. There has been an excitable buzz around the school this week as children and staff can sense the Summer break on the horizon. The children continue to amaze us with their positive attitude to learning and resilience to all that is going on in the world currently.

Some Year 4 pupils had a brilliant opportunity to work with a dance specialist virtually this week which was an exciting opportunity and a lot of fun for the children.

Year 6 pupils were visited by members of the Queen's Guard and learned about keeping safe as they grow older. This event was enjoyed by staff and children alike. We would like to say a special thank you to those members of the Queen's Guard for supporting the school community in this way.


We have had a bit of a shorter week learning in school but we have done so much learn-

ing! This week we have looked at non-fiction texts about reptiles. We have learnt about the different features of a non-fiction text and now know that there is a contents page, photographs with labels and lots of facts and information.

Ask your children if they can tell you a fact about a reptile.

We have been using cotton buds to paint a lizard and we even used marbles to paint a frog and we had to feed the crocodile by reading the words and matching the picture.





Maths

In maths we have been learning all about coins, we can recognise lots of different coins now.

Ivie said, "You do not get a 3p coin you have to use a 2p and a 1p to make 3p".

We used the IWB to play a game to find out how many coins were in the piggy bank. Victoria used the Numicon to count in 10s to 100. Adam used his fingers to help him add up the different coins.



This week we developed our skills in using the paint feature of Doodle Buddy by drawing a flowering plant. We then learnt how to add a text box and position this to accurately label the parts of our flower. We also looked at how to change the font





Year 2





In science, we worked in teams to design and build a bridge strong enough to hold cubes. We used different strategies to do this. We folded and made different shaped to try and make the bridge strong and balanced. At the end of the lesson we put cubes on top of the bridge to see how many they will hold.

















Unlike ordinary pictures which pixelate when enlarged or zoomed into. Vector graphics are images that are produced by manipulating shapes or mathematical equations on a device. This means that the images are scalable, they retain their quality no matter how large or small they are made.

In lessons, pupils used Google Slides to create vector art of their own by positioning and formatting various shapes. Many pupils were really creative, with a variety of creations ranging from animals, buildings, vehicles and game characters including pacman.

It was wonderful to see pupils helping each other develop their skills and show solidarity in their learning.

Year 4 - Journey to the Duat; the Children were Buzzzzing:

This week, Year four have been working extremely hard in all of the lessons throughout the week. During English, pupils have been constructing their own ideas for an adventure narrative by looking at the key features of that text type and retelling the key events of the story. We have had some amazing adventure ideas from pupils: some are tying to find lost relatives; others are searching for legendary Pokémon which are yet to be discovered. In maths, pupils have been revising 2D and 3D shapes, as well as working on different strategies for multiplying and dividing by 10, 100 and some have even looked at 1000!


We also said our goodbyes to our class bananas (Tutenbananamun and Peelpatra). We gathered items which they would find useful in the afterlife and made sure they had access to the Book of the Dead. The process took 40 days in total. We began by removing the insides and we applied salts to remove moisture and dry out the body. After a long wait, we then soaked bandages in resin and wrapped up our pharaohs to complete the mummification process.





For Science this week, children had to create a double page spread to raise awareness about the importance of bees! They were able to discuss the biology of a bee and how important they are to the world around us; in order to help preserve bees, part of their work was to create their own 'bee hotel... or even their own 'Air Bee and Bee'... I think the children liked the work more than the jokes:).





Year 5

On Monday we celebrated our final Year Five curriculum day in the style of a Mini Olympics day. It was an extremely fun day and watching the events was exciting. The events that were in the competition were: 60m sprint, 150m hurdle, 1200m long distance, long jump, vortex throw and shot putt. We were prepared with our sports kits (some of us even chose a country to represent and wore those colours), water bottles and raring-to-go spirit.



Everyone who took part was dedicated and took their events seriously which was impressive to watch. Some of our favourite events were long jump because of the distances that the contestants jumped and the 1200m race at the end because it was intense and exciting to observe.

Although it drizzled a little, this did not bother us because it cooled everyone down when they were competing in their events. Our year group has some fantastic runners, jumpers and throwers; it was outstanding to see how well they did!



As part of our art lessons, we designed and decorated banners representing our colours as well as Olympics logos and colours. It was fun and inclusive to have so many countries of the world represented.





At the end of the day, we held a closing ceremony where we distributed certificates to the gold, silver and bronze winners for each event, as well as the top three athletes throughout the day. Everyone did so well and we are very proud of their efforts.

For English, maths and science lessons this week, we have taken part in and engaged with virtual transition lessons from St Clere's and Hassenbrook Secondary school. We were introduced to some of the teachers, who may be teaching us in September, and were given an idea of what to expect from our lessons at Secondary school.

OPAL Outdoor Play and Learning Launch 2021

Dear Parents,

We are about to launch an exciting new project to make our play times even better, in conjunction with OPAL. (http://outdoorplayandlearning.org.uk/). OPAL has won the best active schools' programme in Europe award and been cited in two



Parliamentary Reports as outstanding practice. OPAL is working closely with Sport England to promote more active childhoods.

We strongly believe that: "Play is freely chosen, personally directed, intrinsically motivated behaviour that actively engages the child. Play can be fun or serious. Through play children explore social, material and imaginary worlds and their relationship with them, elaborating all the while a flexible range of responses to the challenges they encounter. By playing, children learn and develop as individuals, and as members of the community" (Play Council 2001).

The project will start in June. and our hopes are that this project will change the way we think and how we play together. To facilitate this project we will need to buy some new resources, move some things around on the playground and we will also require some loose parts. Loose parts are any materials that can be easily moved, combined, and incorporated into children's free play. The items we are looking for will enable us to enjoy a wider range of play experiences during playtime (see below for some examples):

Suitcases of any size and type, anything on wheels/castors

Plastic milk crates and keyboards

Briefcases, especially hard cased ones

Cones and Noodles (the type you use in the swimming pool!)

kitchen pots, pans, baking trays, work tables, wooden spoons, chopping boards

Tools like spades, trowels and brooms

Tubes of various sizes and various materials, buckets, nets and ropes

Fabric (large sheets/brightly coloured fabric)

Foam sheets / body boards

Wooden pallets and cable drums

Guttering and pegs (to help to set up dens)

N.B. Anything that will **shatter** or is **sharp** is **NOT** suitable.

We will be holding another collection week during the week beginning **Monday 28th June**...... The sooner we do this, the sooner the children will be able to play with the items! Please do not bring your donations in before this date as we will have nowhere to store them. If objects are really large, such as wooden pallets, we will ensure that there is someone available to help you carry them into school. There will be more information to follow at a parents session later in the year. We are really excited about this project and hope that you will support us in our efforts to improve playtimes for all children.
