and the whole staff team, for making this such an exciting week of learning. Please check out our Facebook page for further information and photos from the week.

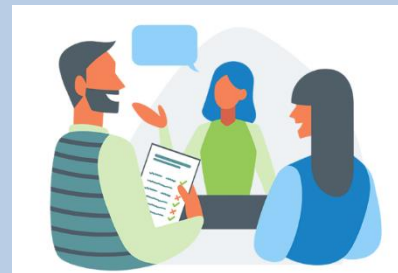
Parent/Teacher Consultation meetings – next week

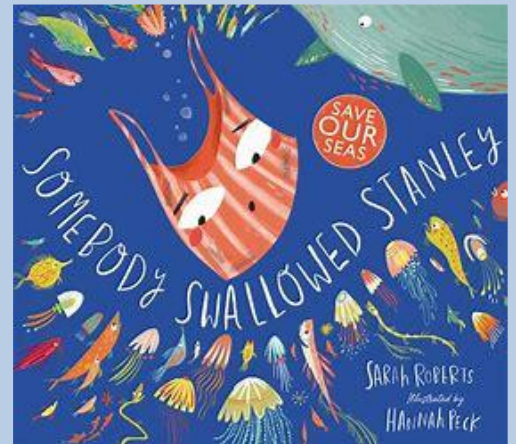
Reception

This week in Reception we have been reading the story 'Somebody Swallowed Stanley' and using our known sounds to write in a narrative style. We found that everyone in the story kept eating Stanley but Stanley was a plastic bag and wasn't meant to be in the sea! We spoke about how we have to keep our seas clean to keep our animals safe.

In Maths we have been exploring doubling and halving using part-whole models to support us.

It has also been science week this week and we have enjoyed exploring shadows.

Here are some photos of our work this week!



Year One

In DT we have been getting creative and designing our own puppets. We then cut them out using a template ready to join them using our chosen method. We are really looking forward to adding embellishments to create features for our puppets!

In geography, we explored what a map is and why we use it. We compared a range of maps including a world map, the London Underground map and a floor plan of a house and discussed some similarities and differences between them.



Class News

Year Two

In English this week we have been continuing our research about Venus Flytraps. The children have been devising their own sub-headings and including their favourite facts to keep the reader engaged. Next week, we will be using this planning to create our own information texts to bring our research to life.

In maths this week we started a new unit about shape and measure. The children have worked well to identify 2D shapes and were introduced to the concept of right angles. We then completed a right-angle hunt around the classroom.

Our Computing work this term is focused on data-collection and representation. This week, we worked in pairs for a mini-beast hunt and recorded our data using a tally.

As part of science week, Year 2 have been engaging in a range of different activities including a 'waterproof testing' experiment. To showcase this year's theme, we designed posters as part of a whole school competition reflecting the concept of 'adapting and changing'.



Year Three

This week is science week in school. This year's theme is 'change and adapt'. This has been an interesting theme as there is evidence of changing and adapting throughout many different areas of science and in our everyday lives. We have looked at what this theme means to us and discussed ways in which we have felt we have changed and adapted to things in our own lives. We created posters for a competition. We joined a live lesson and carried out a practical investigation to find out which materials would be best to be used for tyres to allow them to move the furthest, this involved learning about John Boyd Dunlop (inventor). Also, as part of the 'change and adapt' theme, we researched about animal adaptation and created fact files about them.

In Maths this week, we have been learning about unit and non-unit fractions. We have been finding fractions of whole numbers.

In our topic science lesson this week, we looked at ways we can keep ourselves safe in the sun. We designed a poster with lots of facts on it.

We started our rehearsals this week with year 5 for our Shakespeare Rocks production.

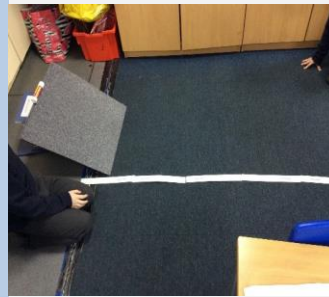
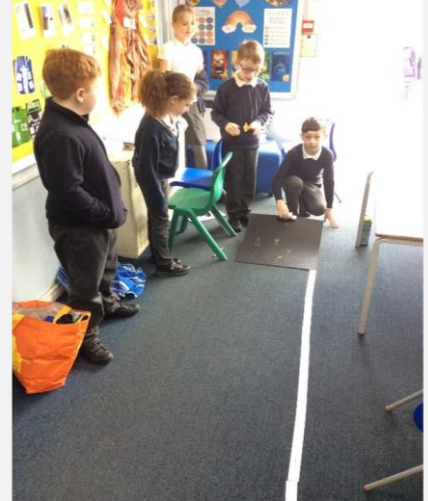

Class News

Year Four

For British Science Week, Year 4 have been considering friction and its uses in everyday life; from being able to rub out pencil markings to stopping a moving vehicle. We have also thought about air resistance and water resistance and how that helps with safety in the air and in water.

Our main experiment was conducted to test how different materials impacted on the 'stopping power' of a cylindrical object by rolling a glue stick down a ramp numerous times, with the glue stick covered in various materials and measuring the distance it travelled.



Year Six

This week has seen the celebration of British Science Week across the school, and Year Six were not an exception. Across the week, themed with the heading 'Adapt and Change', we looked at various science innovations – from boats to toilets; from marble runs to our own heights!

The week started with measurements, where each pupil was measured and a mean-average (our topic in maths!) height was taken across the year group. We came in, at an average, 150.4cm tall. We are sure this will only increase exponentially over the next few years. As a follow up, pupils made 10:1 scale model of themselves, which are shown in the images below. We followed this with two live lessons across the week, the first a marble run, the second about 'floating boats' which were powered by hydrogen. These were followed by investigations. The first finding out how long we can make it take for a marble to reach the bottom of an A3 piece of cardboard with diversions and friction. The second an investigation into what happens to the objects we flush down the toilet.

To summarise our week, posters were made to encapsulate what 'Adapt and Change' means to us individually. Some pupils looked at the seasons and space, others looked how it has impacted their hobbies such as gaming and sports.



Class News

Year Five

This week in Year 5, we have really immersed ourselves in our theme for British Science Week, which is Change and adaptation! To kickstart the week, the pupils explored their height measurements and analysed their class and year group data. Once the average height for each class was established, they created a scaled drawing of themselves. Additionally, they joined in with a national challenge to create a marble run. Pupils worked collaboratively to think about what materials would cause the most friction on the marble run and achieve the slowest time for the marble to roll from start to finish. Given our theme, pupils created posters about Change and Adaptation and researched various things in our lives which change and adapt. We are continuing to empower the children in our Aspiration lessons, children considered what they wanted to be in the future and explored what they needed to achieve that goal. Finally, at the end of the week, the Lower Thames Crossing came to do a British Science Week workshop for an hour. The pupils also enjoyed continuing their DT pop-up book mechanisms, inspired by their world book day character from last week. Pupils had to draw their characters and create a slider mechanism for their design to come to life.

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about FINAL FANTASY XIV

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

The video game Final Fantasy XIV launched in 2010, and, despite being critically panned, it saw an overhaul that has made it one of the biggest success stories in gaming. Its huge world, epic story and versatile combat system have continued to draw in new players, but there's a lot that trusted adults need to be aware of – not least the cost of paying monthly to play.

ALWAYS ONLINE

Final Fantasy XIV is an MMORPG, which stands for Massively Multiplayer Online Role-Playing Game. Much like World of Warcraft, players create a character in a chosen class and level up by completing quests to gain power and items. The game requires a constant internet connection, whether you're playing on PC, Mac, PlayStation or Xbox, and there's no option to play offline.

REGULAR EXPANSIONS

As with similar titles in the genre, players can purchase expansions to unlock additional content for the game. Those without the expansions will be locked out of certain new quests and activities, meaning that young people who play regularly will potentially have the next release earmarked on their calendar, ready to buy it as soon as possible.

IN-GAME PURCHASES & SUBSCRIPTION FEE

Users need to pay £8.99 per month to play Final Fantasy XIV, but there is a free trial. If someone stops paying, they'll lose access to their character (although they'll be able to pick up the payments again and resume where they left off). If a player forgets to cancel their payments, however, those subscription fees will continue rolling on automatically.

FREE TRIAL

Advice for Parents & Educators

MANAGE PLAYTIME

Playtime limits are a great way to counter the addictive qualities of games like Final Fantasy XIV. They allow you discuss why it's still important to enjoy things outside of gaming while still letting a child enjoy playing online with their friends when it makes sense to do so. It's all well and good to have fun with a game, so long as they're able to step away and reconnect with the real world.

MAKE USE OF THE FREE TRIAL

The Final Fantasy XIV free trial is a generous one, with no limits on how long someone can play until their character hits level 70. That's easily dozens of hours for a child to go through the game, complete quests, and see if they enjoy it before purchasing expansions or subscribing to a membership. They may well move on to something else before you need to spend so much as a penny.

Meet Our Expert

Lloyd Coombes is the Editor-in-Chief of GGRecon, and has been working in the gaming and tech industry for five years. A longtime fan of online games, he's also a parent, and therefore understands the importance of online safety. Writing mainly about tech and fitness, his work has previously been published at sites including IGN, TechRadar and plenty more.



PLAY TOGETHER

The free trial makes it extremely easy to jump into Final Fantasy XIV and play alongside a child, provided they're old enough. Not only does that help you ensure that settings are adjusted for their privacy and safety, but it may also end up becoming a bonding experience for you both and any other family members that want to try it out.

REMEMBER, IT'S A PEGI 16

Despite its often-relaxing nature, Final Fantasy XIV carries a PEGI 16 rating for violence and drugs (although the latter is due to a character smoking a pipe on occasion). There's minimal blood, but characters can attack enemies (and other players) with weapons and spells. Take a look at some gameplay videos to see if the content is appropriate for a younger player.

VOICE & TEXT CHAT

Final Fantasy XIV lets players send chat messages in-game or speak to each other over voice chat. On the one hand, that provides plenty of choice for how those enjoying the game can interact with their fellow fans. On the other hand, however, it's easier than in many games to receive unprompted messages from a stranger, with whom you constantly share your play space.

VIOLENCE

While Final Fantasy XIV has a fairly light tone throughout some of its quests, many involve killing enemies and sometimes even wild animals. The violence isn't especially strong – more comparable to a cartoon or anime style – but the act alone may make some children feel uncomfortable, if they're not yet able to separate fictional harm from the real kind.

POTENTIAL FOR ADDICTION

As with World of Warcraft, there's an element of addiction to Final Fantasy XIV. The gameplay loop can be quite engrossing, as minutes turn into hours and hours into days while playing alone or with friends. This can potentially lead to missing real-life events, a lack of interest in any activities not related to the game and procrastination around responsibilities like schoolwork.
