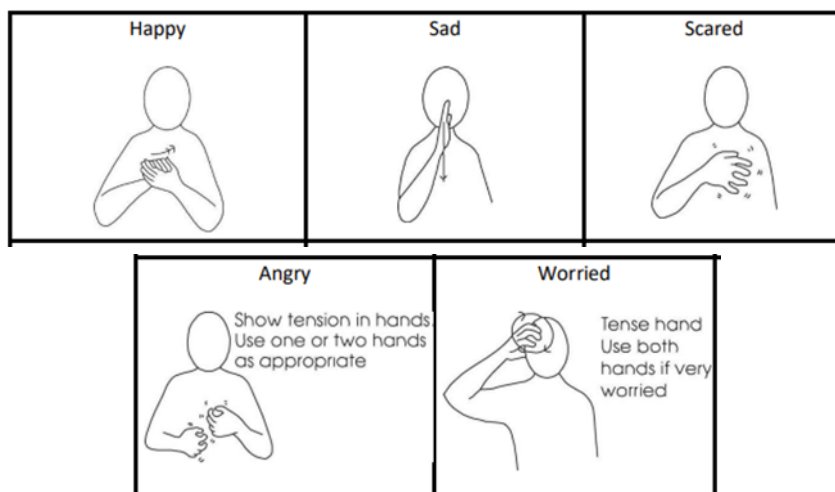

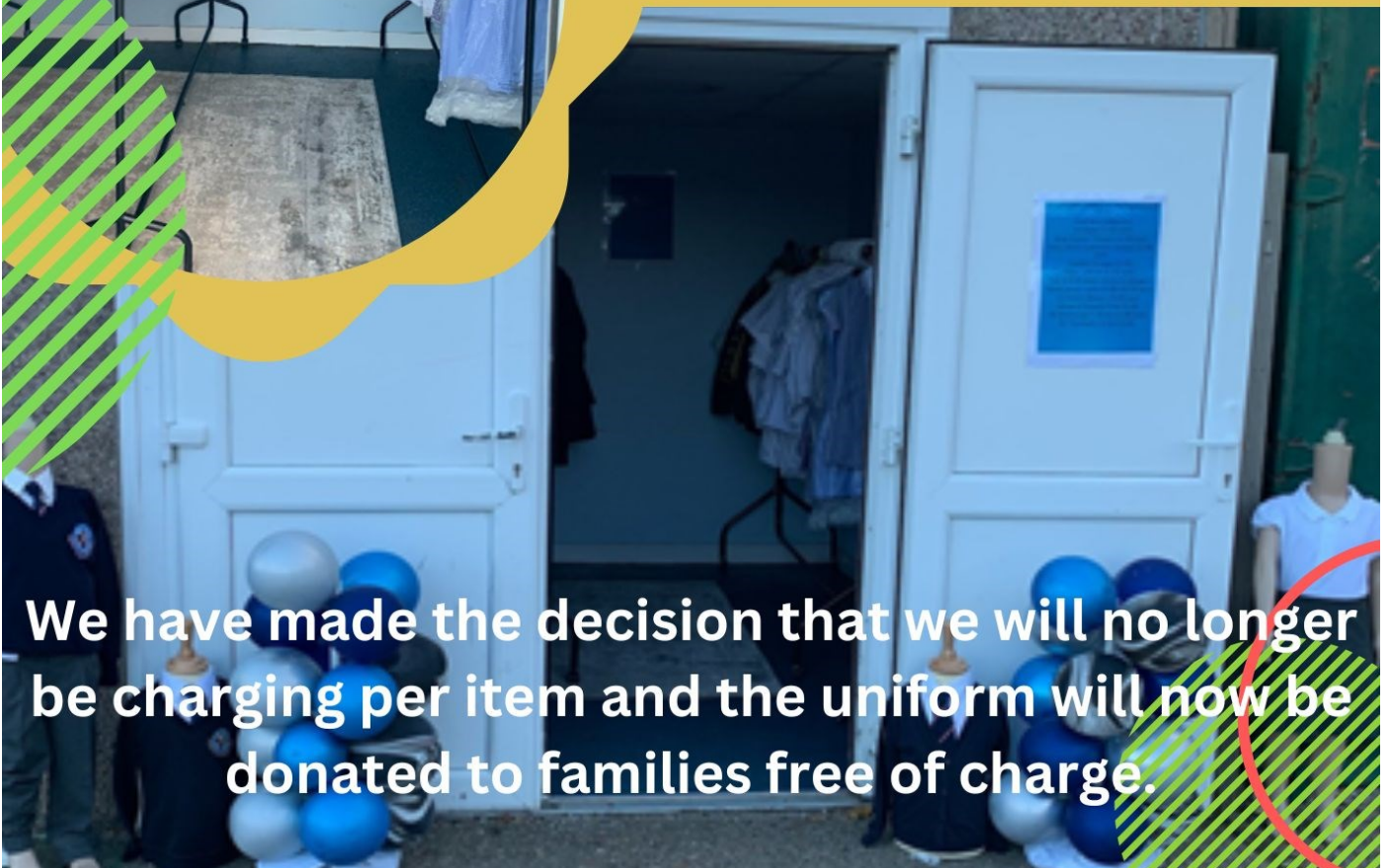

Reception

This half term we are going to be learning all about Traditional Tales in our Topic 'Dream Big'. This week we have been reading *The Gingerbread Man*. On Monday we followed a recipe to create our own Gingerbread playdough and then created our own instructions for people to use. We used our phonics skills to support us as well as using imperative verbs to be bossy and tell people what they need to do!

In maths this week we have been looking at numbers 11-20. We have been using different materials and resources to help us count, and recognising the numerals all on our own.

As this week it will be Eid, we have been looking at foods from different cultures. We looked at them and smelt them and compared them with each other. We enjoyed looking at all the different options and giving our opinions. We looked at a map together to find out where they are all from.



Year 1

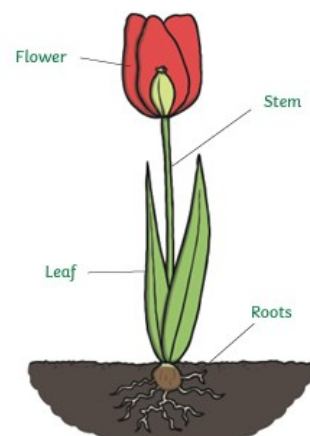
Year 1 have come back to school after half term refreshed and ready to learn!

Their science topic this half term is all about plants where they had lots of fun planting their very own bean plants. The children are thoroughly excited to watch these grow and take care of them. To track the growth of their bean plants, they will be writing in a bean diary weekly to monitor how their bean is growing.

We have discussed the different parts of plants including petals, stems, leaves and roots and what each part of the flower does.

This week we have started our new topic 'The Great Fire of London'. We looked at how the fire started and sequenced the key events in chronological order.

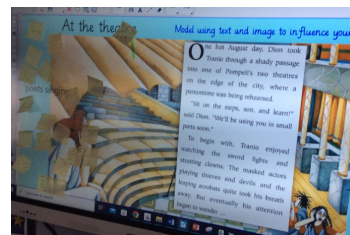
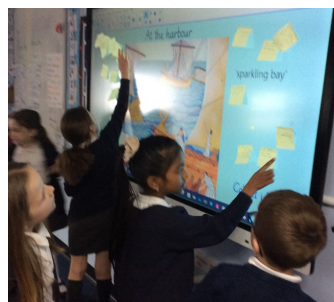


In our science lessons we are learning about animals this half term. This week we discussed different groups of animals (mammals, reptiles, birds etc). We looked at adult animals and matched them with their young.



Year 3

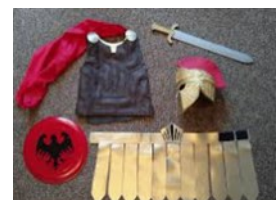
Firstly, it has been wonderful to see all the children back after the well-deserved Easter Break. All refreshed and ready for the summer term, let's hope the sun will join us soon too! Coming up in Year 3, the 'Romans' will inspire half term 4 and 5's learning. Initially, our English lessons are being led by 'Escape from Pompeii' by Christina Balit; this is the story of a young roman boy who describes what happens when Mount Vesuvius erupts in AD 79. This week we looked at creating powerful descriptions using our senses.



In Maths, we are back to fractions; within this unit, we explore the strategies and rules we need to follow to solve addition and subtraction of fractions.

In Science, we started to explore the topic of light. Light sources can be natural or humanly constructed. For example, the sun is a light source but so is a light bulb.

A heads up for parents, the last curriculum enrichment day of Year 3 (14th July 2023), will involve pupils dressing up as Romans!



Year 4

Welcome to the summer term! We hope you enjoyed the Easter break. This term we are looking at Ancient Egypt as our topic. In English we looked in depth at the setting of Ancient Egypt and using sensory language to describe how it would be like.

After exploring various settings, we created a brochure to encourage tourists to visit Egypt.

In maths we continue to look at identifying fractions and revising them for main operations .

Pupils were encouraged to practice time tables and revised on chrome books in preparation for the upcoming statutory Year 4 times table test.

Pupils are encouraged to read and research facts about the Ancient Egyptians Gods to identify their favourite and perhaps draw an image at home of their favourite God or Goddess.



Year 5 - Exploring Living Things; Start of the Great War

This week - upon our return from the Easter break - in year 5, we have been starting our new studies for the term.

In Science, we have opened up our investigation into what makes Living Things so special and different from other, inanimate, things. This was captured in our Science starter task and further embedded by exploring Mrs Gren (the 7 living processes; movement, respiration, sensitivity, growth, reproduction, excretion and nutrition).

Further afield, we begun to study why The Great War - World War 1 - started. This was included in English lessons, where we have looked at what life was like in the trenches to create powerful, yet gruesome, descriptive pieces.

In English, we have been starting to write a newspaper report about the attempted murder of Jack from the nursery rhyme Jack and Jill. Whilst attempting to fetch a pail of water, something went horribly wrong and young Jack ended up at the bottom of the hill in a life-threatening condition and subsequently requiring medical attention.

Our new PE topics have been Cricket and Athletics and pupils have enjoyed exploring different track and field events and looking at various activities for fielding in cricket. Pupils were able to practise throwing and catching skills throughout the lesson by working at different stations focussing on different skills.

Angles not angels—In maths, we have started exploring angles in preparation for our SATs. Pupils have been considering names of different types of angles as well as identifying them within shapes, we have worked on various strategies to identify missing angles in shapes. Also, we have been exploring 2-D and 3-D shapes and their properties; again, these skills will help with their SATs. Some of the shapes we have looked have been regular ones; others have been irregular polygons and pupils have been able to successfully identify various irregular shapes.

FORTNITE

Fortnite may be something of a veteran in gaming terms (having launched back in 2017), but it remains massively popular – with more than 250 million people playing online every month. That's partially due to the competitive nature of its player vs. player combat, its pop culture crossovers and its constantly shifting map. Significant updates are rolled out with each new version of the game – known as 'chapters' – and within these sit shorter 'seasons', which bring more subtle changes. The latest iteration, Chapter 4 Season 2, adds a cyberpunk-themed city and anime-style areas, for example, along with new weapons and characters.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

ALWAYS ONLINE

There's no single-player offline mode in Fortnite: it can only be played online. Internet access can sometimes be an issue when you're out and about (both in terms of connectivity and using up data), so you may find that dedicated young Fortnite players are often less enthusiastic about trips away of a certain length – such as days out and holidays – than you might have expected.

IN-GAME COSTS

Fortnite is free to download and play, but it does offer various additional purchases – cosmetic skins, rare weapons and so on – which don't really impact on gameplay, but can cost quite a significant amount. These items are bought with game's currency, V-Bucks – which can be earned through playing, but are also often purchased from the game's store for real-world money.

POP CULTURE REFERENCES

Part of Fortnite's appeal is its ongoing crossovers with other popular franchises, ranging from movies and TV shows like *The Walking Dead* to comic book characters including Batman to other games such as *Street Fighter*. This means you could find your child asking questions about the creature from *Juon* or who Geralt from *The Witcher* is a little sooner than you'd possibly anticipated.

CROSSPLAY AND PARTY CHAT

Fortnite is popular with vast numbers of gamers – of various ages. Crossplay lets friends play with and against each other, regardless of whether they're on an Xbox, PlayStation or PC – while party chat allows them to communicate during the game. This chat feature can also, therefore, put youngsters at risk of hearing inappropriate language from older players in the heat of virtual combat.

VIRTUAL VIOLENCE

At its core, there's no avoiding that Fortnite is about shooting other players to eliminate them. That said, there's no blood or gore: the violence is generally rendered in a cartoonish style, and there are frequent comical touches to lighten the mood (fishing mini-game, for example). The machine guns, shotguns and other weapons often look and behave realistically, however, so discretion is advised.

FREQUENT UPDATES

The game's developers release content in 'seasons' that usually run for around ten weeks. Each fresh update sees items added to the in-game store, changes to the environment's map and a different over-arching theme (such as 'medieval', 'jokes' or 'party'). These regular renewals help to hold players' interest – but also give young gamers plenty of reasons to keep returning to their screens.

Advice for Parents & Carers

MATCH GAMING TIMES

Younger players tend to want to play Fortnite alongside their friends. With this in mind, it could be worth speaking to the parents and carers of your child's social group and trying to coordinate their gaming around certain hours of the day. Safety in numbers is obviously a factor here, but it will also help your child feel that they're getting adequate opportunity to socialise with their friends online.

SET SPENDING LIMITS

Fortnite's rotating store is a not-so-subtle mechanism for coaxing players into splashing out on those sought-after items before they disappear again for weeks. This could potentially lead to surprise outlays on your card if your child is tempted into an impulse purchase. You could consider setting up a prepaid card for them to use – or ensuring that any online purchases require adult authorisation.

USE UPDATES AS REWARDS

Fortnite's seasonal updates are free – but each one brings the option of a 'battle pass', unlocking exclusive rewards for playing the game and completing set challenges. The passes cost around £8 (and are available as part of larger bundles) and can be an effective reward to young Fortnite fans for good behaviour or academic performance, or as an incentive for chores like tidying their room.

BE WARY OF SCAMS

The immense popularity of Fortnite with more trusting younger audiences means that there's no shortage of scammers looking to fraudulently obtain passwords and other personal data through techniques like phishing. As the developers point out on many of Fortnite's loading screens, they never ask for a player's account password outside of the game: make sure your child knows this.

ENJOY FORTNITE TOGETHER

Fortnite also offers split-screen gameplay, meaning that two people can play simultaneously via the same TV or computer. That's ideal for siblings or when your child's friends visit – but it also offers you an opportunity to spend time doing something fun with your child, while also being able to make sure they're playing the game safely. Who knows, you might even teach them a thing or two!

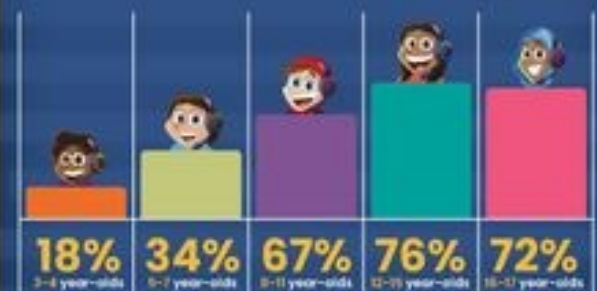
