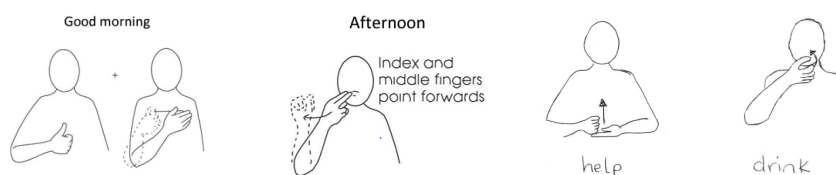
SEND in Focus

During last half term, we introduced Makaton as a whole-school approach. Makaton is a unique language programme that uses symbols, signs and speech to enable people to communicate.

Makaton is designed to meet the needs of people with communication difficulties including: Autism, developmental language disorder, Downs' syndrome, Global developmental delay, hearing impairment and Verbal dyspraxia. However, it is beneficial to all pupils for the following reasons:

- Makaton offers a basic communication method for those who find it difficult to communicate.
- Helps with understanding
- Develops language skills
- Helps build confidence as they experience successful interactions
- Decreases frustration when they are unable to express
- Improves attention skills

Each week, your child will be learning a new sign in class so please encourage them to practise; maybe they can teach you at home. Here are a few signs that we have already introduced:

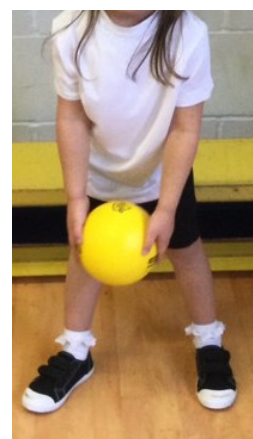
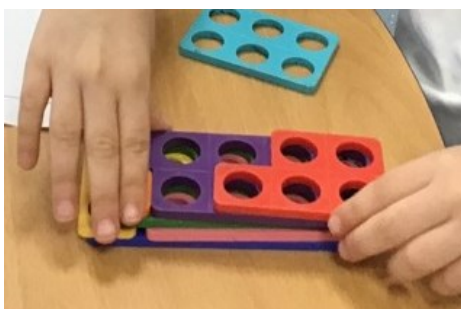
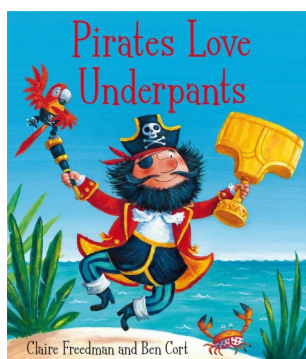
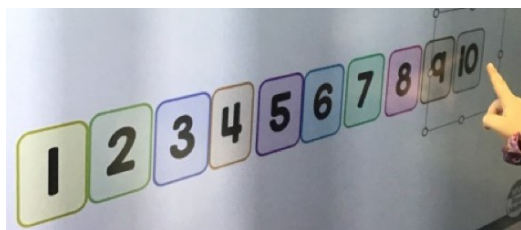
Reception

Our learning this week was based on the story, *Pirates Love Underpants* by Claire Freedman. In literacy, we have been working hard on applying our phonics knowledge. Lots of us have been using known sounds to begin to string some CVC words together to create a short sentence, and some of us learning to use finger spaces and full stops.

Our maths focus continued to be building 9 and 10. Through the week, we practised creating number lines to 10, sorting a selection of 10 items, making two groups, comparing the groups - identifying which has more, which has fewer and how we can make them the same—and finding how many more we needed to make 10.

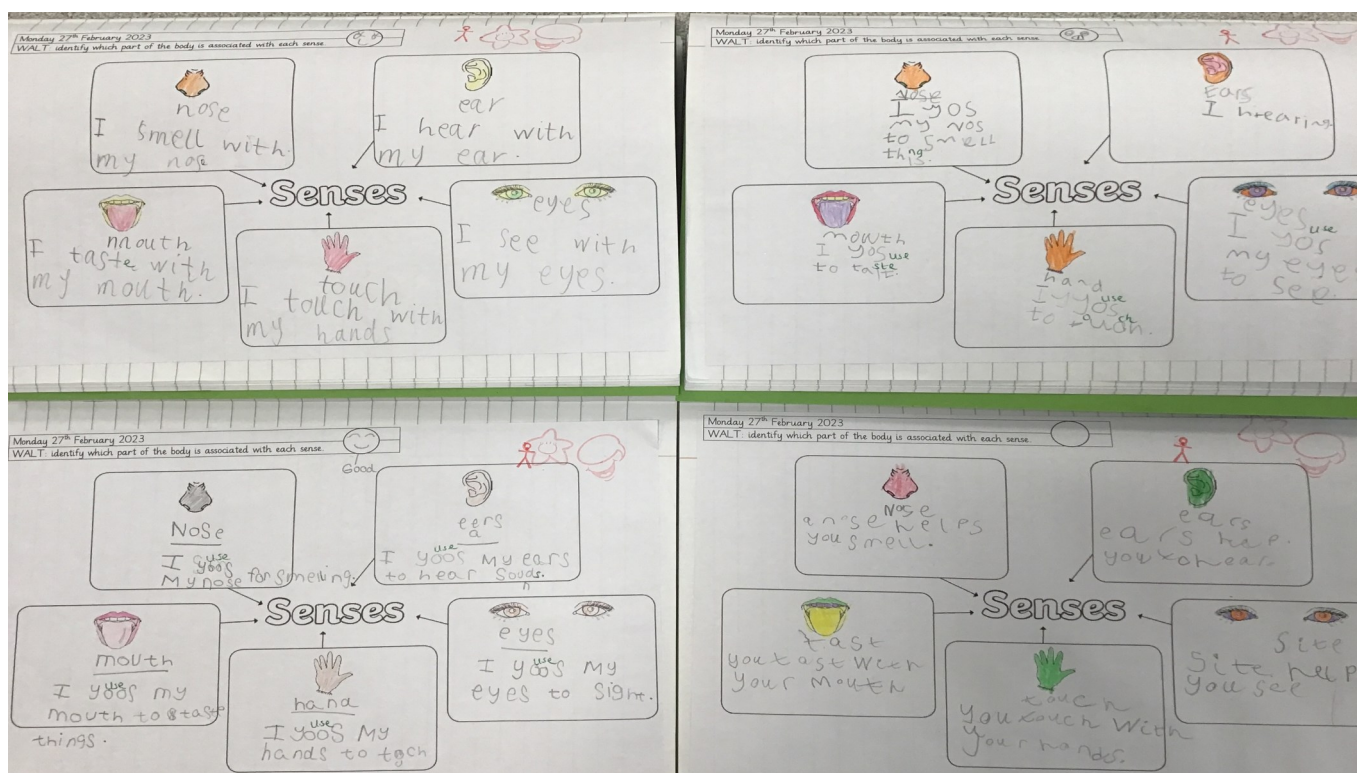
In PE, this week, we practised using underarm and overarm throws to hit a target using bean bags and a variety of balls.

Also, this week, we celebrated World Book Day. We spent the day participating in activities related to the story we focussed on in our classes. We loved dressing up and sharing our costumes, characters and stories with each other!

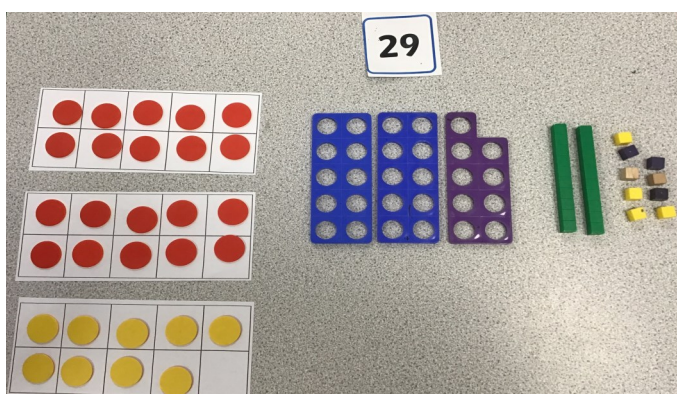


Year One

This week, Year one have continued to explore the human body parts and have focused on our senses. We discussed that humans have five main senses that our body uses everyday. The five senses are taste, smell, sight, touch and hearing. Then we went on to identify which parts of the body is associated with each sense such as tongue/mouth, nose, eyes, hands, and ears. Amazingly, we found out that even while we are sleeping our ears are busy listening to hear what is going on around us..



In Maths this week, we have learnt that numbers can be represented in a variety of ways using a range of maths resources (concrete manipulatives) such as dienes/base ten blocks, ten frames and sets of Numicon shapes. These aided our understanding as we were able to visualise numbers being partitioned into tens and ones. We further developed our learning by partitioning numbers into tens and ones using part-whole model. Year 1 had lots of fun engaging with the activities .



Year 2

In DT we explored a range of toys, looking carefully for levers, linkages and pulleys. Next, we chose our favourite toy to sketch and had to suggest improvements to make the toy even better.



On Thursday, we had great fun celebrating World Book day. We decorated our door, influenced by our favourite book series: Supertato and even hosted our own World Book Day Party. We took on the role of our characters across the day, competing in lots of party games. .

Year 3

In Geography this week, we started to learn about the rainforests and their layers. We also explored the animals which live in the different layers. During PE this week, we carried out team building activities, we used non-verbal communication skills to complete tasks in our teams. In Maths this week, we have been developing our knowledge with fractions. We are now looking at non-unit fractions and learning how to compare them and put them in ascending order.

On Thursday, we had world book day. We dressed up as book characters and spent the day researching our favourite authors. We have all helped to design our classroom doors using a theme from one of our favourite books. During the afternoon, we enjoyed a party with our friends to celebrate world book day and we read books to the year 6 pupils.



Year 4

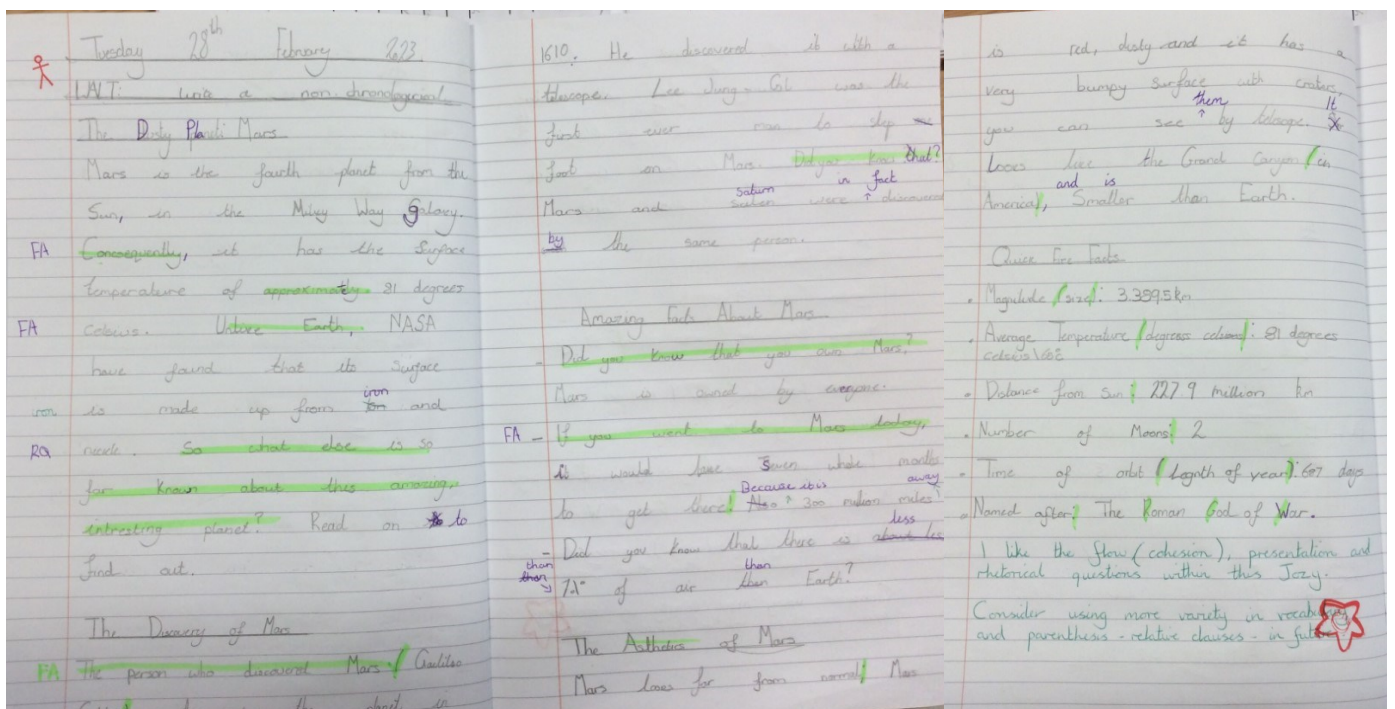
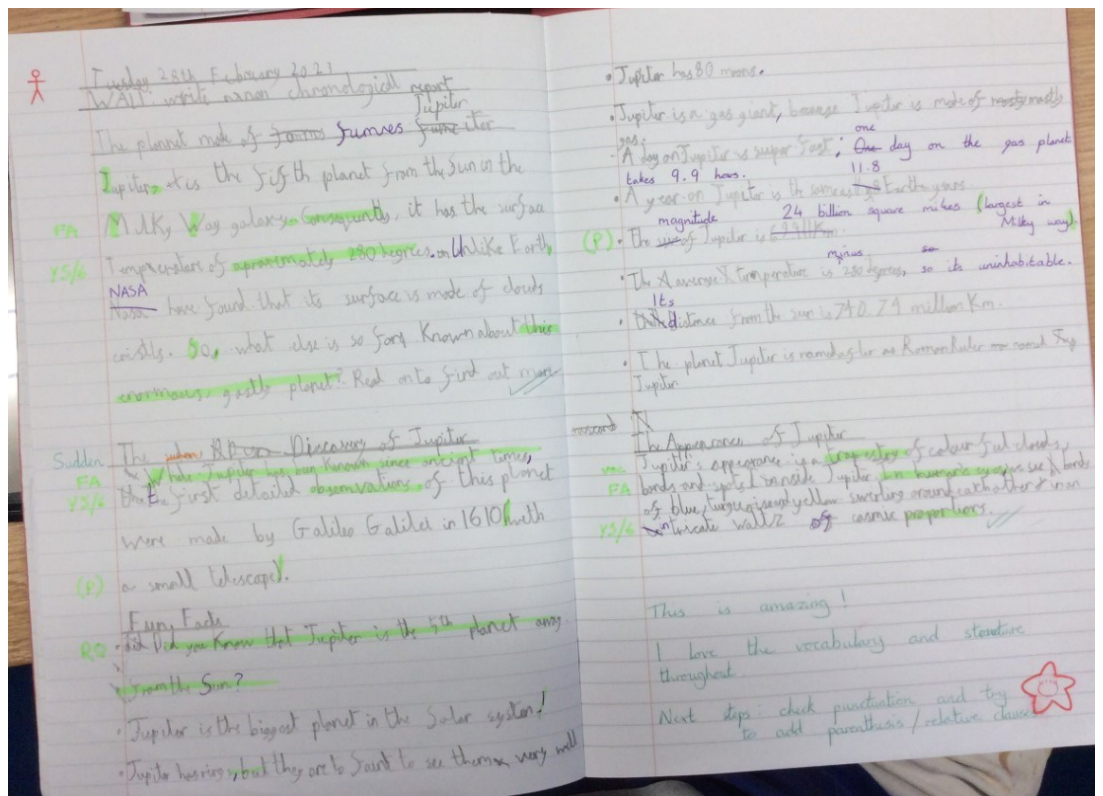
This week in English, the children have been looking at the features of a play-script such as; character name; stage directions and how to say the line. By the end of the week, the children would have completed their own play – scripts. In maths, there has been a range of activities including, looking at fractions, division and finding the missing length on a shape. In PE, the children have been completing a selection of fitness activities – bleep test, cross- country, sprint relays. On Thursday, it was World Book Day, a range of fun activities based around the Lorax had been planned throughout the day and the children and staff dressed as their favourite characters.



Year 5 - Exploring the Milky Way.

Year 5 have, this week, explored and researched the Milky Way - the solar system, as opposed to the delicious chocolate bar (the author says, writing this dressed as Augustus Gloop). Using this research, we have constructed our very own non-chronological reports, flowing with fun, fascinating facts. This has enabled us to deepen our understanding of our Science topic: Space and Beyond, and additionally teach each other these facts.

Our text type for the next couple of weeks is instructional writing.

This has been the focus of our writing this week and—surprisingly or not—the pupils have been able to come up with a plethora of creative ways to annoy their teacher.

“Sadly, for all school pupils, these ogre-like creatures (known as teachers) exist. Their main objective is to make all pupils’ lives hell!”

“Unfortunately, for many pupils in schools, they have to put up with dull, moany teachers on a daily basis.”

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

NGL

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

NGL (which stands for 'Not Gonna Lie') is an app through which users share a link to their Instagram story or Twitter account, inviting their followers to give anonymous feedback. The app includes some prewritten questions (such as 'if you could change anything about me, what would it be?'), plus the option to ask followers to simply 'send me anonymous messages'. All replies go into the user's NGL inbox, with the sender remaining anonymous – although subscribers to the app can receive hints about who each message was from.

ANONYMITY AND OVERSHARING

Anonymous messaging gives rise to the 'online disinhibition effect', which causes users to feel detached from their words and actions in the digital world. This can make young people in particular (as they tend to act more impulsively online) far more likely to disclose personal information on the internet, as well as making ill-judged confessions or revealing their fears and insecurities.

PROTECTION FOR BULLIES

Having their identity hidden makes bullies feel safe from repercussions, so anonymous chat sites are a major avenue for cyberbullying. NGL claims to use AI to filter out insulting terms, but our expert sent a range of such phrases (starting with 'love' and 'ugly', and becoming progressively more offensive) to a 'dummy' account. All of these trial messages were delivered to the recipient's inbox.

COSTLY SUBSCRIPTIONS

NGL offers a subscription where – for a weekly fee – users can unlock hints about who's been messaging them, including the sender's approximate location and which device they used. Young people will naturally be extremely curious about who sent which message (especially if they have a lot of Instagram or Twitter followers) and may be unable to resist spending money to find out.

INFLATED ENGAGEMENT

In June 2022, NGL had to revise its terms of service, informing users if a message was sent by the app's developers as opposed to genuine followers. It emerged that, previously, NGL's makers had attempted to boost engagement with the app (as well as enticing users to pay for subscriptions) by sending fake anonymous messages from bots. This update was rolled out very quickly by the team.

QUESTIONABLE SUPPORT

NGL does have a 'report this message' button for users to flag upsetting content. After sending a message, however, an automated reply arrives stating "... NGL is 100% anonymous and we have no way of knowing the identity of the user and would not be able to find out, even if we tried." This did not fill our expert with confidence that the app can address bad behaviour adequately.

ACCIDENTALLY GOING VIRAL

The messages on NGL itself are anonymous, but users can share these messages via their Instagram story or Twitter feed – enabling all their followers (or anyone, if their accounts are set to 'public') to see them. If a young person has disclosed something embarrassing or identifiable on NGL, without realising, this information has the potential to be re-shared very quickly to a far wider audience.

Advice for Parents & Carers

DEALING WITH NEGATIVITY

Blocking another user on NGL will prevent them sending anonymous messages to your child in the short term – although a determined abuser could get around that obstacle simply by setting up a new Instagram account. If your child continually receives negative messages that upset them, it might be worth encouraging them to consider whether they really need to use the app at all.

EXPLAIN ANONYMOUS APPS

We understand that a conversation with your child about the risks of anonymous messaging may seem difficult to initiate (especially if you aren't that comfortable with using social media yourself). It is vital, however, that young people understand that, for some people, having their identity obscured online can make them feel more powerful and less accountable for their actions.

BLOCK IN-APP PURCHASES

To avoid your child running up an eye-watering bill through an NGL subscription (or indeed any kind of costly in-app purchases), go into the settings on whatever devices they use to go online and either disable the ability to make purchases or protect that function with a password. If those options aren't available, it's prudent to ensure there aren't any payment methods linked to their account.

THINK BEFORE SENDING

Regardless of whether a messaging app is anonymous or not, it's a good idea to regularly talk to your child about how it's wise to think through what they're sharing before they post it. Emphasise that nothing is truly private once it's online, if the post is something your child might hesitate to say to someone face to face, then it's probably not the sort of thing they should be writing online either.

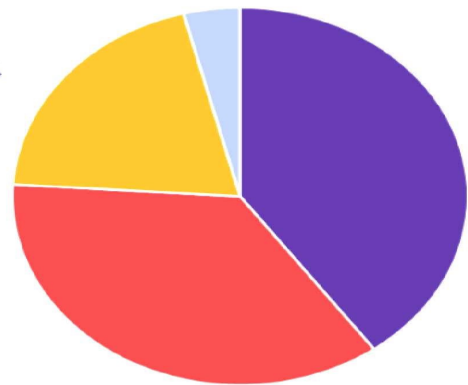

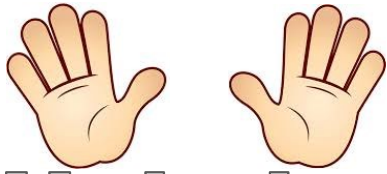

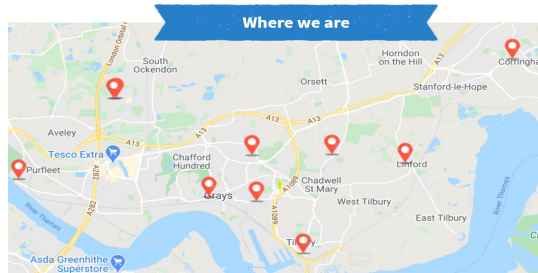
