



## Reception

This week in Reception we have been reading a story called 'If Sharks Disappeared' by Lily Williams. We have been creating our own reports about what a happy and sad sea look like and what we can do to look after our sea. We have started to write our own

short phrases and captions all on our own and we are very proud!

In Maths we have been looking at 9 and 10 and different ways these can be represented and trying our best to spot patterns in the numbers. We have started to be able to recognise amounts of objects without having to count each object.



## Year One

It has been another exciting week in Year One, where the highlight was undoubtedly celebrating World Book Day! All the children looked wonderful in their costumes and it was so lovely to all share our favourite stories and characters together. We completed a range of activities throughout the day, such as making bookmarks, writing a book review, completing a book scavenger hunt and enjoying ourselves at our World Book Day parties!

Also this week, in our R.E lesson we discussed the Christian celebration, Easter. We shared our own experiences of celebrating Easter and discussed the ways in which Christians celebrate. We considered the meaning behind Christian's celebrations of Easter, such as the giving of eggs to symbolise new life. We then created a poster to demonstrate our understanding of some of the ways that Christians might celebrate Easter.

In Geography, we built on the knowledge we acquired last week where we looked through a variety of maps and identified the similarities and differences between them and the aerial photography. The children then created a 'messy map' showing the location of objects to help an alien to make their way around our classroom. It was lots of fun!

In Music, we learnt a new song called the Name Song which the children all enjoyed. We practised finding the pulse/beat - the heartbeat of the music, the rhythm - long and short sounds over a steady beat or pulse, pitch (Melody) - high, low, rising, falling, tempo - fast, slow and dynamics - loud, quiet.

This week, year 2 have been continuing to divide in maths. We have been looking carefully at the patterns that we can find within our times tables-particularly within our 2s and 10s. To check our answers are accurate, we have been using the inverse operation (multiplication). In English this week we have begun our new topic about plants. By the end of the unit we will have completed an information text featuring key facts and appropriate information about plants. On Thursday, we completed lots of World book day activities and even had the opportunity to share our favourite books with one another. Our favourite part of the day was our world book day party where we learnt the lyrics, reading them line by line, to a Matilda: The Musical song.

## Year Three

This Thursday, Year 3 had an absolutely brilliant time celebrating World Book Day! From enchanting costumes to thrilling activities, it was a day to remember. Here's a glimpse of our magical day: **Fantastic Costumes**: Our children showcased their creativity with a mix of stunning shop-bought outfits and marvellous homemade costumes. Every character brought a story to life!

Mystery Escape Room: The day was filled with adventure as the children delved into a virtual escape room inspired by The Eerie-on-Sea mystery books.

Secret Santa Style Book Swap: In the afternoon, our children participated in a Secret Santa style book swap. They shared their love for stories and recommended their favourite reads to peers. Each child received a peer's name and carefully chose a book recommendation based on their friend's favourite genre. They wrapped and decorated books, which proved to be a delightful surprise to unwrap!

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## Year Four

Another week complete in the busy world of Year Four. This week has been incredibly hands-on, practical and well outright busy... again! In English, we have started writing up our own interpretation of the story 'The Iron Man'. Our narrative involves the pupil's protagonist exploring the mystery of a robot which has been spotted around their location. 'Where had it come from? Nobody knows. 'Where was it heading? Not a soul knew. What was its purpose? We have no idea.' Well, our narratives end off a cliffhanger, so these questions hold relevance throughout the whole of their written piece... Maths – this week has been a fraction challenging for our pupils; some might say so challenging we have been getting mixed... Pupils have been working exceptionally hard on fractions this week and it has ended up with the conversion of mixed numbers to improper fractions.

Geographical creativity: Our budding geographers have been creatively representing the way in which rivers flow through different places. They had to create a model which showed the journey from the upper sources, through the middle source and all the way to the lower source. They only had this image to inspire them and here are the results.



### World Book Day:

Pupils have celebrated World Book Day by dressing up as their favourite characters. We enjoyed exploring the characters as well as the books we loved. The pupils took part in a live lesson and some activities around books throughout the day. We were all challenged by the 'Reading Escape Room', whereby pupils had to solve puzzles using their reading, inference and deduction skills.

The children enjoyed participating in the The Great Big Footy and Booky Quiz, hosted by Kit Brown and with Football School author Ben Lyttleton. Another live lesson was provided by the BBC, where we were able to join hosts Maddie Moate and Joe Tasker, alongside a line-up of incredible authors including Alex Falase-Koya, space scientist Dr. Sheila Kanani, comedian and author Rosie Jones and official World Book Day illustrator Vivian Truong.

We also delved into the book series 'The Eerie-on-Sea Mysteries' and worked in small groups to solve escape room style puzzles based on the books.

Finally, we celebrated with a World Book Day party, where the children attempted to remain in character throughout the afternoon.


