

Reception


It's been another busy week in Reception! This week we have been reading Supertato by Sue Hendra and Paul Linnet, where we have been using our new vocabulary to describe key parts of the story. We have been thinking carefully about what we can see and hear and how the characters might be feeling. In Maths we have been exploring doubles and trying our best to spot doubles and the patterns we notice. We have learnt that a double is when we add two numbers together. We have all created our own butterfly doubles this week to support us with our learning.

Today is Curriculum Day and we have been learning about and celebrating all things Chinese New Year. We have explored where China is on a map and looked at the celebrations that people do for and in preparation of Chinese New Year. We have had a go at creating our own dragon masks for the year of the

Dragon and lots of other crafts!

Year One

In maths this week, Year 1 focused on additions. They used their knowledge of number bonds and related facts when adding within 20. The children were able to see how this is a more efficient method of adding by using counters and tens frame and base 10 to see the links between related facts. They were able to notice for example, 11 +6 is 10 more then 1 + 6. They enjoyed working in pairs, using three ten frames. One made a number between 0 -4 and the other made a number that is 10 more. They discussed what was same and what was different. They then rolled a die and added that number of counters to their ten frames. The children wrote their number sentence and discussed what they noticed about their answer.



Year Two

Year 2's focus this term is all about space. In English they have been learning about the astronaut Neil Armstrong. They worked in pairs to write a range of questions they would like to have asked him if he was alive today. In addition to this, year 2 created beautiful collages of space. They included rockets, planets, satellites, and stars. We think they look amazing!









Year Three

For English this week, we continued to plan and begin writing our independent write. We are adapting the narrative 'The Magic Paintbrush' to make our own version.

During Maths this week, we have been looking at multiplication and division. We have been looking at different methods which we can use to work these questions out independently. We used manipulatives such as cubes, counters and multilink as a resource to secure our knowledge when dividing, we enjoyed this practical activity.

In Science, we carried out an investigation to observe how our biceps and triceps work together to make movements. We recapped our previous knowledge by carrying out a quiz.

Our history lesson this week was focusing on Julius Caesar, we used the Chromebook to carry out research about his life and we made a double-page spread to display the information we found.

For our curriculum enrichment day this half-term we learnt how to programme micro-bits on a simulator and download it onto the micro-bit. We also enjoyed using instruments in our music lessons.

Year Four - Exploring 'How sound travels?'

Balloon filled with air particles.







When popped, all these particles rush out and hit the adjacent air particles. Those particles hit the next set of particles, and so on. Thereby creating an expanding shell of particles bouncing into each other, this is called a sound wave, which travels through the room and eventually applies a force to your ear drum. This causes parts of your internal ear to move. Then your brain processes this motion in your internal ear and tells your cognition that this motion in your ear sounds like a balloon popping.

Here we used marbles to demonstrate the teeny tiny particles, that carry sound. Once hit, the particles scatter and create a chain reaction which then side the sound ways to travel

aids the sound wave to travel.



You can also think of it, like dominoes, with the vibration getting passed along from one bunch of particles in the air to the next, creating a sound wave.



Year Five

Year 5 have been studying the Ancient Maya civilisation of Mesoamerica this half term. They have learned about their knowledge of the solar system, how they used a form of place value and many of their traditions. This week we attempted to play a Maya sport known by historians as Pok-a-Tok where players had to try and keep a ball off the floor without using their hands or feet.

Year Six

In art this half term, we have been exploring artwork themed around space. As well as exploring space themed paintings, we have looked at artwork using a variety of materials, including textiles and even architecture. We started the unit by testing a selection of materials, such as water colour and oil pastels, to recreate a section of artwork. We then used the recycling the children had brought in to make callograph plates, which are plates of cardboard covered in textured materials which can then be used for printing. This week, the children used their callograph plates to print a background for their own space artwork. They also planned the space drawing they will be including on top of their printed backgrounds. On Friday, we also spent curriculum day immersed in the world of Ancient Greece. We are looking forward to sharing our photos and experiences in next week's newsletter.

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

MONKEY

Also known as Monkey Cool, this platform aims to fill the gap left by Omegle (which has now shut down) by placing users in random video chats with strangers. Participants use their mobile number and Snapchat username to connect to the service, where they can make matches, message other people and join group chats. The mobile version has been removed from the App Store due to safety concerns, but iPhone owners can still access the site via their web browser. The app remains available on Google Play, where its listing claims that Monkey has more than 30 million users worldwide.

THE RISKS? AGE-INAPPROPRIATE

WHAT ARE

CONTENT

The app claims to use AI to detect sexual content or activity that violates its policies, along with having a 24/7 moderation team. However, reports in the media continue to indicate that explicit content remains commonplace on Monkey (including sexually graphic or violent material) and is therefore accessible to anybody who uses the app – including those aged under 18.



IN-APP SPENDING

While Monkey is free to download, it nevertheless offers in-app purchases promising to unlock access to premium features. For example, users who wish to make use of 'Knock Knock chat' (Monkey's text-based messaging option), rather than the app's Chatroulette-style random video calling feature, will need to pay to be able to do so.

CONTACT WITH STRANGERS

The obvious risk in accepting random video chat partners is that users cannot know what or who they will see on their next connection. Talking to strangers is, of course, potentially dangerous – especially for children who might be persuaded to meet up with these people offline. The app lets users find each other by location, increasing the chances of a child being matched with a stranger from their local area.



According to Monkey's privacy policy, personal information (such as name, profile picture and date of birth), user-contributed content (any photos, texts, videos and screenshots shared) and each user's browser and IP address are collected. That is a considerable amount of data for Monkey to gather on its users – and all of this information is shared with third narties

Advice for Parents & Carers

DISCUSS THE DANGERS

Even if you're comfortable with your child using Monkey, it's still important to talk about the potential dangers. It's crucial, for instance, that young people recognise the risks that stem from video chatting with strangers; that they understand not to share identifying information (like their street or school name); and that they know what to do if they are exposed to inappropriate content.

RESTRICT IN-APP PURCHASING

If your child is accessing Monkey via an Android device, you can prevent them from making in-app purchases through the device's settings. If you do allow your child to use the site, we'd recommend that you enable this feature: young people have been known to spend significant amounts of money in their desire to unlock more features in apps such as this.

REPORT INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Monkey states in the safety section of its site that "people are given the power" and that, to a large extent, Monkey is "self-governing." If a user is exposed to sexually explicit or inappropriate content on the platform, they can select the 'police' emoji in the top right corner of their screen to submit a report for Monkey's moderation team to review.

SPOT THE SIGNS

If you're concerned that your child is spending too much time on Monkey – or that they may have been exposed to inappropriate or distressing content – it's important to watch for potential indications that they've been affected emotionally. They could be unusually irritable or unable to concentrate, for example, or failing to complete their homework or even to eat regular meals.

Meet Our Expert

Dr.Claire Sutherland is an online safety consultant, educator and researcher who has developed and implemented anti-bullying and cyber safety policies for schools. She has written various academic papers and carried out research for the Australian government comparing internet use and sexting behaviour of young people in the UK, USA and Australia.




