Hi Everyone, Mrs Mylam (SENCo) here.

I'd like to introduce a new section to the newsletter called 'SEND in Focus'. This dedicated section will allow me to share useful strategies, resources and local service provisions that might be of interest to you and your child. I will start this off with some advice and resources to support fine motor development. Please let me know if there is anything specific that you might like added in future newsletters.

Fine motor refers to development of the smaller muscles within a person's body, ie hands, fingers and toes. These muscles enable children to carry out everyday activities such as holding a pencil correctly, buttoning their shirt

or tying their shoe laces, as they develop their eye-hand coordination, eye-finger coordination and their finger strength and control.

Children with fine motor difficulties are supported in school through fun and engaging activities. Why not check out these links and have some fun with these at home using everyday items:


We are extremely proud to be supporting 'Jeans for Genes' on Friday 17th September 2021.


Ciarroom catch up

Children will continue to use outdoor spaces to support their learning.


The children have all thoroughly enjoyed getting to know their new teachers and the class teachers have defiantly enjoyed getting to know their new class too!

We spoke about our British values, focusing on democracy. We worked as a class to vote for our class learning councillor and our Wellbeing Ambassador.



In science, we have introduced the unit of living things and their



habitats. The discussed and identified things that are living and non-living.

Year 3

The year 3 teaching team are so proud of how well all children have settled back into their school routines this week.

Our focus this week has been on good listening and following instructions well, and we have been absolutely amazed with the behaviour from our pupils. They have displayed great manners and respect for both staff and their peers.

In English this week we have been designing our own super heroes! The children gathered some brilliant language examples and used these to create their own word banks to support their writing. By the end of the week, all children produced their own comic strips.

In maths our focus has been on presentation of our books, as well as a recap of the place value skills that we have already learnt. In addition to this, 3RM found some brilliant new times table songs this week and have had great fun practising these.

Year 4 A Positive Start

Year 4 were very excited about returning to school. When asked, many of the pupils explained how they have been looking forward to experiencing working with different teachers, in a new class and with a new mix of children.

As part of this week's orientation activities, pupils listened attentively as our Nurture focus was explained in a year group assembly - it was great to get everyone together! Additionally, each class has elected their class School Councillor and Wellbeing Ambassadors, created a collaborative piece of artwork and enjoyed completing a range of team-building games in the playground.

Alongside setting out expectations for the year ahead, this week pupils have enjoyed being introduced to aspects of the curriculum such as revisiting adjectives and adverbs in our Grammar lessons, recapping timetables in Maths, and categorising animals in our Science lesson. Through the week, all pupils have been read with by a teacher, with many moving book bands.

Well done from the Year 4 Team to all pupils for making such a positive start to the term. We know you are very keen to find out more about the opportunities ahead, we look forward to seeing you again next week!


Year 5

We have returned after the summer holidays and are no longer year four! Our amazing new year fives have returned back from the holidays eager, enthusiastic and ready to learn. We have been looking at what life is like in Upper Key Stage 2. Pupils have been exploring a variety of well-being sessions this week. We have looked at aims and ambitions for this year, as well as how we can help somebody who may be feeling down.

One of the pupils' favourite sessions was looking at the 'Power of Compliments'. Each pupil was given a leaf and a name of another pupil in the class; they then wrote compliments about the person they had been allocated and read them aloud to the class. Students were able to recognise how powerful the smallest compliment could be and they noticed that every member of the class left the session with a smile on their faces! Some even had to compliment the adults... that could be a tough task at times! These leaves will be placed around the classroom and as the pupils further develop throughout the year, we will add leaves every half term, in hope of creating 'branches of compliments within the room'.

We have returned to our Reading Skills and Maths groups and pupils appeared very excited to be getting back to their old ways and the students have settled in very well. We have completed a circle time session discussing our summers, an introduction to the Vikings and have began reading our class text: Viking Boy. Pupils appear very excited by our new class text. We have completed an activity based on Year 5/6 writing and

I must say, the pupils are getting into the swing of things right away! Great work Year 5, keep it up!





Year 6

Year 6 have settled back into school life extremely well this week and the Year 6 teaching team are very impressed with their positive attitude to learning. All of the children should be proud of how they have returned to school and represented the school values. The children have been enjoying beginning their class reading books this week and listening to the adults read to them each morning.

Another favourite activity was a Pirate game we played in the first 2 days, in which the children used their knowledge of coordinates and addition to battle against one another and win the most points.

This week we also discussed the importance of having a growth mindset for our learning. We thought about the barriers we face when trying to learn and what we can do to overcome these. The children created comic strips to represent this.



We also ventured into our new topic of World War 2; researching how it began, the countries involved and other topics of interest to us. We then used our research to create decorative double page spreads, displaying our information.









Here at East Tilbury Primary School, we have a whole school Nurture approach. This means that we keep wellbeing a focus and ensure we are nurturing the social and emotional development of each child.

This week, each class has looked at the 6 principles of Nurture together, discussing what we already do around these principles and what they would like to do to make it even better.

6 Principles of Nurture

- Children's learning is understood developmentally.
- The classroom offers a safe base.
- The importance of nurture for the development of wellbeing.
- Language is a vital means of communication.
- All behaviour is communication.
- The importance of transition in children's lives.

"I like that everyone is included in the Nurture approach."

"My classroom is a nice place to learn."

"I like how teachers are thinking about children's emotions with this approach."

Nurture Nook

This year, each of our classrooms across the school has a Nurture Nook. A Nurture Nook is an area of the classroom which has resources in to support the emotional wellbeing of our children. The children are able to access the Nook on agreement with the adults in their classroom, at a time that they feel it would benefit them.

COMMIT TOBEFIT!

PE Kit

Please ensure your child has their PE kit in school and it fits properly. Children have regular growth spurts and ill fitting clothing can leave them embarrassed or unable to move as freely as they would like.

Hair

Hair must be tied back for PE if it is likely to go in your child's eyes. This is to keep them safe.

Earrings

We recommend that earrings are not worn on PE days. Taking earrings out is time consuming and fiddly for many children and earrings are easily lost. Recently pierced ears can be taped for the first month after piercing but the tape must be provided by the parent/carer. We cannot provide this.

Rocket League is a free-to-play multiplayer vehicle football game. It was developed by Psyonix, now part of the Epic Games family (which also includes Fortnite and Gears of War). Rocket League is essentially a football game where, instead of running, the players drive rocket-powered cars. The game was a surprise hit that took the world by storm when it first released in 2015. Rocket League is available for the Xbox One, Xbox Series X, PlayStation 4 & PlayStation 5, Nintendo Switch, Windows PC, MacOS and Linux.

Credits can be earned by playing the game or can be bought with real money – which could prove expensive if a child ets their love of the game and desire to progress get the better of them.





Advice For Parents & Carers

Use Parental Controls

Psyonix has added some safety measures into the game. The text and voice chat can be disabled, for example, limiting contact from strangers. However, it's not currently possible to block contact from other players about trades. It's a good idec then, to talk with your child about the possibility of scams and bad trades either before they download the game or early in their Rocket League 'career'.

Stay Aware of Spending

Free-to-play games can become money sinks without children realising. For peace of mind, make sure you don't have any payment methods attached to your child's gaming account to avoid accidental purchases. Rocket League credits can be earned through gameplay or bought with real money: encourage your child to use their earned credits first before they ask you to top them up.

Monitor Gaming Time

It's impractical to sit and watch your child every time they play Rocket League. Keeping an eye on their gaming hours is crucial, however: it's easy to lose track of time while playing (even for adults), so 'one more game' can soon tum into ten more games. Helping your child to balance their gaming time with their homework, chores and other activities is a life lesson in time management.

Encourage Regular Breaks

Sitting in the same position all day while gaming isn't healthy, but it is an easy habit to fall into. A short break every hour or half hour is important. It allows players to rest their eyes, brains, hands and arms. Learning the value of an occasional break from any activity is good practice for the future. Encouraging your child to rehydrate regularly can also help to lower any rising competitive tempers!

OPAL Outdoor Play and Learning Launch 2021

Dear Parents,

We are about to launch an exciting new project to make our play times even better, in conjunction with OPAL. (http://outdoorplayandlearning.org.uk/). OPAL has won the best active schools' programme in Europe award and been cited in two



Parliamentary Reports as outstanding practice. OPAL is working closely with Sport England to promote more active childhoods.

We strongly believe that: "Play is freely chosen, personally directed, intrinsically motivated behaviour that actively engages the child. Play can be fun or serious. Through play children explore social, material and imaginary worlds and their relationship with them, elaborating all the while a flexible range of responses to the challenges they encounter. By playing, children learn and develop as individuals, and as members of the community" (Play Council 2001).

The project will start in June. and our hopes are that this project will change the way we think and how we play together. To facilitate this project we will need to buy some new resources, move some things around on the playground and we will also require some loose parts. Loose parts are any materials that can be easily moved, combined, and incorporated into children's free play. The items we are looking for will enable us to enjoy a wider range of play experiences during playtime (see below for some examples):

Suitcases of any size and type, anything on wheels/castors

Plastic milk crates and keyboards

Briefcases, especially hard cased ones

Cones and Noodles (the type you use in the swimming pool!)

kitchen pots, pans, baking trays, work tables, wooden spoons, chopping boards

Tools like spades, trowels and brooms

Tubes of various sizes and various materials, buckets, nets and ropes

Fabric (large sheets/brightly coloured fabric)

Foam sheets / body boards

Wooden pallets and cable drums

Guttering and pegs (to help to set up dens)

N.B. Anything that will **shatter** or is **sharp** is **NOT** suitable.

We will be holding another collection week during the week beginning **Monday 28th June**...... The sooner we do this, the sooner the children will be able to play with the items! Please do not bring your donations in before this date as we will have nowhere to store them. If objects are really large, such as wooden pallets, we will ensure that there is someone available to help you carry them into school. There will be more information to follow at a parents session later in the year. We are really excited about this project and hope that you will support us in our efforts to improve playtimes for all children.

Thurrock Council secondary school admissions

If your child has just started the last year of primary education, you must now apply for a secondary school place.

Important information – applying for a secondary school place for September 2022

If your child was born between 1 September 2010 and 31 August 2011, you must apply for a primary school place for September 2022.

Apply online from 1 September at thurrock.gov.uk/admissions

Go to thurrock.gov.uk/admissions and select 'Secondary school admissions'. You will be able to open an online copy of our prospectus for Thurrock primary schools, booklet called **Secondary Admission Information September 2022**, which you should read carefully before applying.

You must have an email account to apply online.

You should also try to join us online at one of the briefing sessions before you complete an application.

Three briefing sessions for parents will be held on Thursday 16 September 2021 via webinar on the council website.

First Session: 1pm - 2pm; Second session: 4pm - 5pm; Third session: 6:30pm - 7:30pm

Go to thurrock.gov.uk/admissions and select 'Secondary school admissions' to access the webinar.

Offers will be available for applicants via your online account from 12:30am on 1 March 2022.

Apply for a secondary school place

When making an application you can list up to six schools that you wish to apply for, in your order of preference. You can list schools outside of Thurrock – including grammar schools – if you wish.

If you are applying to any school that is religious by character, make sure you also complete their supplementary form and return it direct to the school by the closing date for applications.

If you have more than one child transferring to secondary school, you must apply separately for each child needing a place.

If you do not complete the application and return it by the closing date of **31 October 2021** you may be given a place at the nearest school with a space available, after all on-time applications have been dealt with.
