Classoom catch up

Reception

This week in Reception we have been learning all about houses and homes. We have enjoyed drawing our own houses, designing our own wall paper and junk modelling a new house for the class bear.


In Literacy we have been designing a new house for the old woman who lives in a shoe. We have been working really hard on our pencil control, trying to hear the initial sounds in words and writing our names.

In Maths we have been looking at repeated patterns. We have used a variety of resources to support us, such as paint, shapes and cubes. We have been correcting patterns with mistakes as well as continuing complex patterns.

Today we have had a visit from a Dental Nurse and have enjoyed learning all about teeth and how to look after them, We even earnt certificates for our super listening and learning!







Year 1

In DT we have been learning about mechanisms. We have been looking at wheels and axels and how they work to move an object. By following instructions, we designed and made our own peg cars using wheels and axels to make it move. We had so much fun racing our peg cars once they were made.

Year 2

On Tuesday we had our enrichment day. We had a whole day of Geography.

We first learnt about Antarctica. We looked at the physical and human features . We noticed that Antarctica has more physical features than human fea-









We also learnt about the cold and hot places around Earth. We used a map to identify the warm, tropical, temperate and cold

Throughout the last couple of weeks we have focused on human and physical features of East Tilbury and Nairobi (Capital city of Kenya). From this we then compared East Tilbury, Nairobi and Antarctica, focusing on their physical and human features.











This week Year 3 have been applying Talk for Writing techniques to their English learning, this involves to fully engage with a text. After listening to another section of

our class text 'UG' we summarised the story by creating story maps.









To further deepen our understanding of the events, we retold the story using Pie Corbett's story telling actions, we also came up with some of our own.

In maths we started to look at addition and subtraction of 2 and 3-digit numbers, to solve the calculations we continued to apply our knowledge of place value as well as visual aids, such as dienes and place value counters.













Year 4 - Save endangered animals



Year 5

We explored jumping in PE, and it's safe to say we all went the eggstra mile.



In order to eggsplore objects and their protective properties, we completed the Egg Drop Eggsperiment. Our brains were scrambled after this eggsillerating spectacle. I'm not yoking when I say that some eggs also met a gruesome end. All jokes aside, it was great fun and the year 5 team won't need to shell out for breakfast for a couple of days! Thank you for everyone's enthusiasm and we look forward to cracking into more science in the future.

Year 6

This week, Year 6 celebrated our Art Curriculum Day using the works of Henry Moore as our inspiration. Henry Moore is most famous for his bronze body sculptures. These are abstract (showing emotions or shapes rather than being real). Lots of people think the wavy, rolling shapes in his sculptures are supposed to remind us of the landscape of Yorkshire, where Henry grew up. We conducted an artistic study of him in our sketchbooks; exploring how his experience of World War Two shaped and influenced his artwork, and opinions of his artwork. We used different media such as sketching, charcoal and collages to create our art.





In Science, we researched how we could use Morse Code in circuits. We learned how to send messages to our classmates and design codes for them to decode using the Morse Code alphabet. Morse code was a way of sending messages to each other, without using any letters! War ships during World War II used to use Morse code to speak to each other while they were out at sea. This was partly to hide their messages from the German Nazis, so that messages were

secret.

Support Maths Learning At Home

Keep an eye on our Facebook page for regular updates and links about how you can support your child's Maths learning at home.





Do you receive any of the following?

- Income support
- Employment Support Allowance (Income Related)
- Income based Job Seekers Allowance

What Parents Need to Know about





Pokémon GO has been among the world's most popular mobile games since its spectacular release in 2016. It's recently enjoyed a resurgence, thanks partly to people combining entertainment and exercise during lockdown. In Pokémon GO – like the Pokémon TV show, trading card series and other video games – players capture, train and battle with their Pokémon creatures: physically exploring locations while using augmented reality via their phone's screen. The game generally provides a positive experience, but there are still some safety concerns to consider.

ENVIRONMENTAL HAZARDS

Pokémon GO requires players to visit in-game landmarks like Pokéstops and Gyms. These are often situated at public real-world locations such as churches or post offices. Sometimes, however, they can inadvertently end up being placed in dangerous areas which are unsuitable for children, even when accompanied by an adult: near a construction site or a main road, for example.

STRANGERS & MEETING OFFLINE

Players often cooperate with friends in the game, and there are many online discussion hangouts. As well as sharing tips and info, these groups may arrange to meet offline to catch Pokemon or attend raids (communal events where players flock to the same real-world place for a mass battle). This can put children at risk of being messaged and invited to meet by strangers under the pretence of talking about the game.

DATA COLLECTION

When a player logs into their Pokémon GO account, the game collects personal data about the user and their device. Locations, emails, names, ages and even camera images can all be accessed. What then happens to this information is open to debate. Niantic, the game's developers, maintain that they do not sell user information to third parties — but the fact that they have it at all is a concern, nonetheless.

VISIBLE PROFILES & LOCATION

Pokémon GO players can add each other as 'friends' in the game by sharing their trainer codes. Two trainers who do this can then view each other's information, such as their username. If a username gives any clues to the player's real name or personal details, a stranger may then be able to look them up online. The game also lets users upload images to social media, which could publicly disclose a child's exact location.

IN-GAME PURCHASES

The game uses a currency called Pokécoins, which can be bought for real money (in bundles between £0.79 and £99.99) and exchanged for in-game items such as Pokéballs and berries. It's extremely easy for a child to purchase Pokécoins (even accidentally) if there's a payment method connected to their mobile phone – and possibly rack up a sizeable bill without realising it!

Advice for Parents & Carers

PLAY ALONGSIDE YOUR CHILD

Finding and catching Pokémon with young ones could turn into a great mutual hobby. At 25 years old, it's one of the few games franchises that spans two generations. Enjoying the game together will give you plenty of new things to talk about with your child—and if you played Pokémon in your own childhood, you might impress them with your knowledge of the digital critters!

ENCOURAGE AWARENESS

Remind your child of the physical dangers they could face while catching Pokemon and emphasise staying aware of their surroundings. The game will often alert children (through their phone) when they are close to an interesting Pokemon item—usually sending them excitedly rushing off to find it—so they should never play Pokemon Go near busy roads or in places they don't know well.

DISGUISE THE EXERCISE

One of Pokémon GO's benefits is that it encourages young (and not-so-young!) ones to get exercise outdoors. Some parts of the game can be completed from home but it's best experienced while walking around your local area. Certain tasks (like visiting Pokéstops) can be repeated every day – and an hour outside having fun catching Pokémon will hardly feel like exercise at all!

USE AN OLDER PHONE

If children use an older phone to play Pokémon GO, then they won't be walking around with their own new device, which could get broken or stolen. Parents are also far less likely to have left a credit card linked to the old mobile. It also means that you can limit the amount of information used to set up an account, and what companies who gain access to your data can do with it.

AGREE PLAY BOUNDARIES

Ensure your child knows where they are (and aren't) allowed to go searching for Pokémon, when they have to be home, and how often they can play the game. Talk to other young Pokémon GO fans' parents or carers to see what boundaries they set for their children. Lunchtimes (if allowed by the school) or after school are ideal times for getting some exercise and catching all those Pokémon!

COMMIT TOBEFIT!

PE Kit

We still have few children who are not bringing PE kit. If your child is to perform at their best, and more importantly be safe when doing so, they need correct PE kit and plimsolls or trainers.

Hair

Hair must be tied back for PE if it is likely to go in your child's eyes. This is to keep them safe.

Earrings

We recommend that earrings are not worn on PE days. Taking earrings out is time consuming and fiddly for many children and earrings are easily lost. Recently pierced ears can be taped for the first month after piercing but the tape must be provided by the parent/carer. We cannot provide this.

Clubs have started this week and it's been wonderful to see so many children participating in so many things, including outdoor learning, football, netball, multisports, mindfulness, boardgames and creative writing to name a few.

OPAL Outdoor Play and Learning Launch 2021

Dear Parents,

We are about to launch an exciting new project to make our play times even better, in conjunction with OPAL. (http://outdoorplayandlearning.org.uk/). OPAL has won the best active schools' programme in Europe award and been cited in two



Parliamentary Reports as outstanding practice. OPAL is working closely with Sport England to promote more active childhoods.

We strongly believe that: "Play is freely chosen, personally directed, intrinsically motivated behaviour that actively engages the child. Play can be fun or serious. Through play children explore social, material and imaginary worlds and their relationship with them, elaborating all the while a flexible range of responses to the challenges they encounter. By playing, children learn and develop as individuals, and as members of the community" (Play Council 2001).

The project will start in June. and our hopes are that this project will change the way we think and how we play together. To facilitate this project we will need to buy some new resources, move some things around on the playground and we will also require some loose parts. Loose parts are any materials that can be easily moved, combined, and incorporated into children's free play. The items we are looking for will enable us to enjoy a wider range of play experiences during playtime (see below for some examples):

Suitcases of any size and type, anything on wheels/castors

Plastic milk crates and keyboards

Briefcases, especially hard cased ones

Cones and Noodles (the type you use in the swimming pool!)

kitchen pots, pans, baking trays, work tables, wooden spoons, chopping boards

Tools like spades, trowels and brooms

Tubes of various sizes and various materials, buckets, nets and ropes

Fabric (large sheets/brightly coloured fabric)

Foam sheets / body boards

Wooden pallets and cable drums

Guttering and pegs (to help to set up dens)

N.B. Anything that will **shatter** or is **sharp** is **NOT** suitable.

We will be holding another collection week during the week beginning **Monday 28th June**...... The sooner we do this, the sooner the children will be able to play with the items! Please do not bring your donations in before this date as we will have nowhere to store them. If objects are really large, such as wooden pallets, we will ensure that there is someone available to help you carry them into school. There will be more information to follow at a parents session later in the year. We are really excited about this project and hope that you will support us in our efforts to improve playtimes for all children.

Important information – applying for a secondary school place for September 2022

If your child was born between 1 September 2010 and 31 August 2011, you must apply for a primary school place for September 2022.

When making an application you can list up to six schools that you wish to apply for, in your order of preference. You can list schools outside of Thurrock – including grammar schools – if you wish.

If you are applying to any school that is religious by character, make sure you also complete their supplementary form and return it direct to the school by the closing date for applications.

If you have more than one child transferring to secondary school, you must apply separately for each child needing a place.

If you do not complete the application and return it by the closing date of **31 October 2021** you may be given a place at the nearest school with a space available, after all on-time applications have been dealt with.
