Classroom catch up

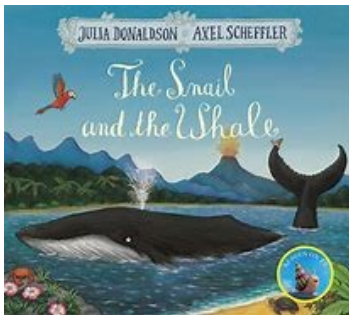
Reception

This week in Reception we have been learning about the book 'The Snail and the Whale' by Julia Donaldson. We have been writing a new message from the snail, telling everyone that the whale is stuck on the beach.

We have been working collaboratively to make different things from the story. This week we have made a whale with tissue paper, we have tried papier-mâché to make a volcano together and we have painted a brown bear together. Then we have put our collaborative work in our classrooms. We have also made snails using play dough.

In Maths we have been learning all about shapes, we first looked at recognising and naming the different 2D and 3D shapes. Then we moved onto making a reflection using shapes and cubes.

On Friday, we learnt about Easter and did some Easter activities, like an easter egg hunt! We are very excited for Easter and we hope you have a lovely break.



Year 1

This week, Year 1 have had so much fun doing all things Easter! They designed and made some beautiful Easter cards, listened the Easter story, and went on an easter egg hunt! In addition to this, Year 1 had a very mysterious event happen. The year 1 teachers each had an easter egg on their desk and then suddenly they went missing! The children were so excited about this event, it encouraged them to write some amazing mystery stories about what they think might have happened to the eggs.

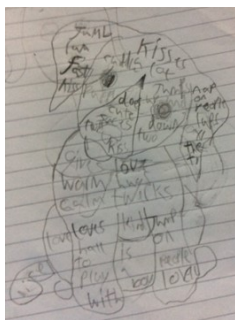
In Art, we decorated our paper mâché planets. We worked in our groups to paint our planets, using the correct colours for each one. As we have been learning about textures, we used a range of different media in our paint. We had washing up liquid, sand, cornflour and shaving foam. We discussed what the different media made the paint feel like.



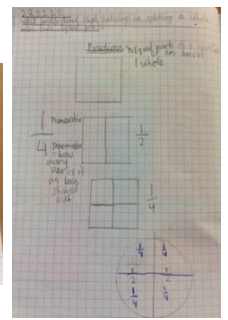
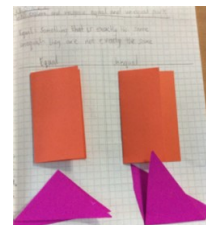
Year 3

Another week completed, here are just a few examples of the learning that took place in Year 3, across the curriculum.

In English, we have completed the unit on shape poems. We looked at calligrams, words or a piece of text in which the design and layout of the letters create a visual image related to the meaning of the words themselves. We researched our favourite animal and created shape poems using the skills we acquired throughout the unit.



In Maths, we started a new unit, Fractions! Firstly, we discussed the importance of equal parts, the mathematical vocabulary (numerator & denominator) then we explored halves and quarters of shapes, objects and numbers.



Our music lesson was inspired by the sounds you can hear in the rainforest, again we used our creativity and made our own Rain sticks and Pan-pipes to replicate the sounds we heard.

Finally, Happy Easter from the Year 3 Team.



In English pupils have been writing a balanced argument. Inspired by The Lorax story and the pollution inducing Oncer's Thneed Factory, pupils have considered different perspectives on the important topic of environmentalism.



Additionally, this week has also seen the conclusion of our creative dance lessons in PE. These have explored various dance routines and choreographed pieces to music. In small groups pupils created their own pieces linked to the Lorax.



Through this week, pupils have advanced their mathematical understanding about area utilising their improving times table knowledge alongside their more-than, less-than and equal to understanding.



As a year group we are pleased that through the half term pupils have shown continuing progress with their multiplication speed and accuracy. We have encouraged the children to participate in our TTRock Star tournament over the Easter break.



In Science this week, pupils created an electrical circuits and explored objects that make great conductors or insulators. Check out our pictures below.

Year 5

This week the children have been completing a project where they have had to learn a Mayan craft. Options available were to make a Mayan house, headdress, mask, weaving or a codex (a Mayan book of hieroglyphics). They have had to research the craft so that they knew what it was and how it would be carried out. In groups, they had to plan how they will carry out the craft. We have had some interesting creations and the children have enjoyed being creative to show off their new skills.

We have also had a creative week in science, starting to make our own solar systems using paper mache.

In PE, the children have been continuing to develop their throwing and catching skills. They have then been able to play games of cricket where they have been able to use these skills.

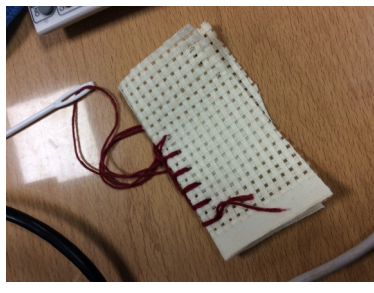
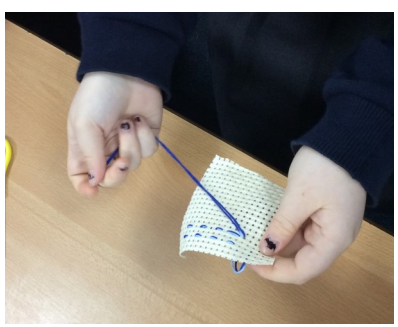
As we come to an end of the second term of the year, hope you all have a wonderful Easter break.



Year 6

This week, Year 6 had our curriculum enrichment day, in which we focused on textiles in Design and Technology. During the week we were given the design brief to design a modern sandal for a young child, which has been inspired by the style of Ancient Greek sandals. After learning about Ancient Greek footwear, we created our designs and realised they had to include straps!

On Thursday, we then spent some time practising different types of stitches, including; running and blanket stitch. We then went on to create a prototype of our sandal using felt. We sewed two pieces of felt together, with a piece of card in between for the sole, and then sewed straps onto it, which we had decorated with stitching and buttons. The children all did amazingly, and I think many found a new hobby in sewing.

Short Term and Working Memory

Children can be forgetful at times especially when it comes to uninteresting tasks, such as brushing their teeth. Although there is often nothing to worry about, there are other skills that your child will need as they grow older requiring effective use of their memory skills. Having good memory skills is one way for them to stay organised and remember all sorts of information without writing everything down. So how can you improve your child's memory skills? There are different and numerous approaches to help your child enhance their memory skills.

Why not give some of these games a try:

- Kim's Game – Place a number of objects on a tray (these can be general items or items of interest ie their favourite toys). Allow your child to look at the objects for a fixed period of time and then cover them over. What items can they remember?
- What's missing? Set the tray up in the game above but this time take an item away. Ask your child what item is missing. Alternatively, you can add an item. Can they tell what is different?
- Memory cards – Using a normal deck of playing cards or matching pictures, turn them face down and ask them to turn them over to find the matching pair.
- Memory bag – Place a number of objects in a bag. Pull out one object at a time and place them in front of your child. When all objects have been displayed, put them back into the bag and ask them to pull them out in the same order (they can look at the objects or use touch to identify them).
- I went to the... The first person uses the statement 'I went to the...' (you can choose a place ie supermarket/football stadium/zoo etc) . The next repeats the statement and names the first person's answer followed by their own...and so on. If you want to make the game more difficult, you can use the alphabet, starting each answer with the next letter in chronological order.



Whole School Nurture Approach

This term has seen a development in the Wellbeing Hub, with it now been open each day for lunch. It has been wonderful to see so many children access this brilliant provision.

This week our Wellbeing Ambassadors met which was lovely to have them altogether. We spoke about the Whole School Nurture approach and what was working really well and what we could do to make it even better. It was lovely to hear their ideas and we are looking forward to working with them to embed the approach further.

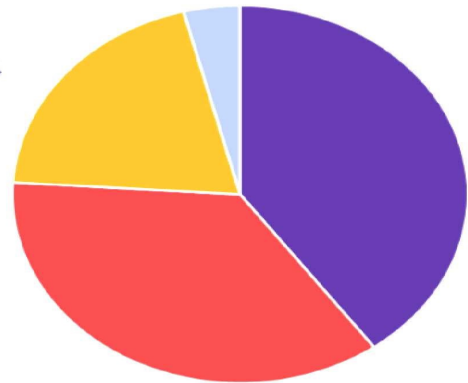

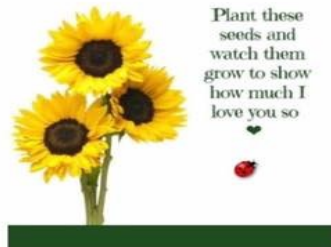

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about FACEBOOK

AGE RATING
13+

With 2.9 billion users, Facebook, owned by the recently rebranded Meta, is the world's most popular social media platform. It encourages interaction with other people by (among other things) adding them as friends, reacting to or commenting on their content, sharing images and videos, posting status updates, joining groups and playing games. Facebook is free, and anyone over 13 can join – but with no age verification, younger children can easily create an account: it's likely your child is already familiar with the platform, even if they don't yet use it themselves.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

ADDICTIVE NATURE

Facebook's quick reward cycle of likes and comments on shared posts can be hugely addictive, it encourages users to keep returning to past things and increases FOMO (the Fear Of Missing Out), which leads to people checking the app even more frequently and finding themselves endlessly scrolling through content.

CYBERBULLYING

A 2021 Ofcom report found that around one in four UK 12–15-year-olds had been cyberbullied or trolled (intentionally antagonised online). On Facebook, this can happen through private messages (on Facebook Messenger); hurtful comments on their profiles and posts; pages or groups set up purposely to torment a victim; or exclusion from pages or groups.

FUTURE IMPACT

Like most social media platforms, anything posted on Facebook leaves a permanent 'digital footprint'. This can have future consequences for young people: many universities and employers, for example, now review someone's Facebook timeline during the application process.

CONTACT FROM STRANGERS

Just like in the offline world, there are people on Facebook with malicious intentions. Ofcom reports, for instance, that 30% of 12–15-year-olds have received a friend request from a stranger. This, sadly, can include individuals seeking to take advantage of impressionable youngsters.

OVERSHARING

Facebook encourages you to post "what's on your mind", but children should be wary of revealing too much about themselves online. Users can give away their location by checking in or using Facebook Live, for example, while some photos can also be traced using file data.

INAPPROPRIATE CONTENT

Facebook monitors and removes material like hate speech or extreme political views, while adverts on the platform are now forbidden from targeting under-18s based on their interests. Offensive content isn't always taken down instantly, however, so there's still a risk of children encountering it.

VIDEOS AND STREAMING

Facebook Live lets users stream video live to their friends or watch others' broadcasts. Viewers can comment in real time, which is problematic to moderate. Short, user-created clips called Reels can now also be displayed on profiles and feeds. These video features could contain unsuitable material or allow children to be coaxed into doing something on camera that they wouldn't normally do.

Advice for Parents & Carers

KEEP ACCOUNTS PRIVATE

In the settings area, you can choose whether a Facebook profile is public or private. By far the safest option is to switch your child's to private, so they can only interact with people who they are friends with on the platform. Facebook's settings can also prevent your child's personal information (such as contact details, school name or date of birth) from appearing publicly.

ENCOURAGE SAFE FRIENDING

Facebook can help your child to stay connected with the people and the things that they care about. However, it's important for them to understand that they should only accept friend requests from people who they know. The key questions to consider are "has your child met them in person?" and "do they know and trust them enough to feel comfortable accepting them as a Facebook friend?"

LEAD BY EXAMPLE

Let your child watch you using Facebook – this will demonstrate how it can be used safely and appropriately, reducing the risk of them encountering harmful content themselves. Teach them the habit of thinking before sharing anything online and try to follow the same rules that you set for them – so if you agree time limits on your child's Facebook use, then you should stick to them, too.

SAVVY SHARING

Make sure your child realises that what they share online with friends can end up being shared again by others. It's important that they think about what they share online and who they share it with. Facebook's 'Audience Selector' gives users the option to filter who sees what they are sharing, whenever a status is updated, photos are uploaded or anything is posted.

RESPECT BOUNDARIES

Once you've talked about Facebook safety with your child, give them some space and trust them to make smart choices. Make it clear, however, that you're always open to discussing social media if they need to. In the early stages, you could occasionally review your child's social media activity with them to put your mind at rest – but take care not to become reliant on checking it every night.

BLOCK AND REPORT

On Facebook, you're able to report harmful content and block particular people or groups so they can't contact your child or view their profile. Before they start spending serious time on the platform, show your child how these features work and explain why they might need to be used. Facebook's Bullying Prevention Hub offers advice on dealing with harassment on the platform.

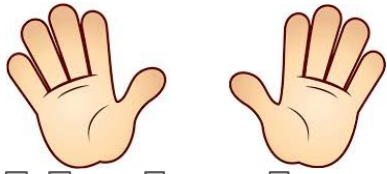

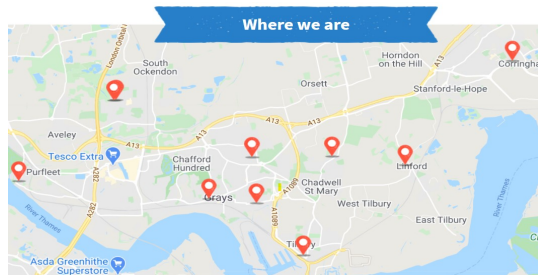
