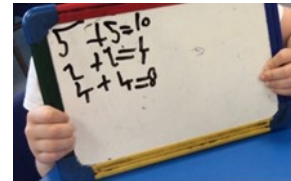
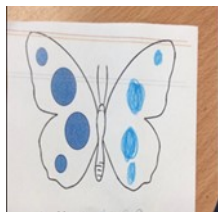
Classroom catch up

Reception

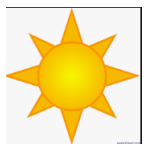
We have had another exciting week in Reception! Following the release of our butterflies last week, we have been learning about the life cycle of butterflies. We enjoyed making it out of play dough and discussing the various stages.



In English, we have been looking at *The Hungry Caterpillar* and *Waiting for Wings* and we discussed the differences between fiction and non fiction books. In Maths, we have been using butterflies to double numbers and we have been learning to count in twos.

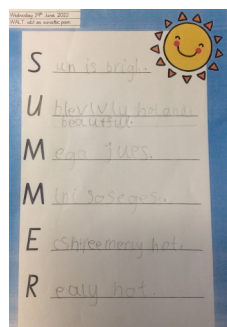
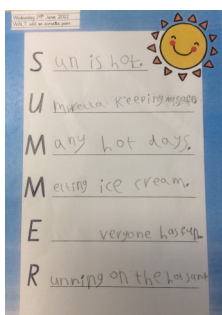


The children have enjoyed lots of free painting and creating and especially enjoyed making our own wings.

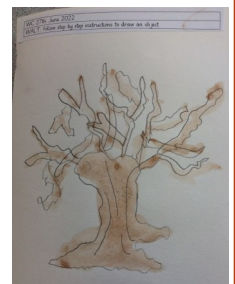
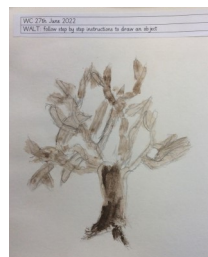


Year One

In English this week we have continued our learning about poems. Our focus this week, was on acrostic poems. We enjoyed reading a range of different acrostic poems and discussed the features of them. We then made our own amazing acrostic poems about Summer.



In Art we were learning how to follow step-by-step instructions to draw an object. We carefully followed instruction to draw a tree. After, we used water colours to add colour to our drawings.



In Maths this week we have been learning about money. We identified the different types of coins and notes, and spoke about their value. We also had lots of fun practising counting coins to make a given amount.



Year 2

In science we have been building bridges (literally). We worked in teams to design and build a bridge strong enough to hold at least 1 toy car. We had to think and discuss our ideas before deciding on a design. We considered shapes and how to fold the paper to make the bridge strong. After a short while, we worked out the a concertina shape was effective, so we tried to use that when building our bridges. It was very interesting to see all of our different ideas come together!



In English, we have finished writing our adventure stories! We used our plans from last week to write our stories. We have been using expanded noun phrases, similes and interesting verbs! Our teachers are really impressed with our work and have said it is our best yet! We cannot wait for you to read them.



In Maths we have been exploring capacity using standard and non standard units of measure. At first we looked at a range of different containers; we explored each of the containers to see which one had the most and least capacity. After, we compared capacity by pouring water from one container to the other, we then described the differences using the key vocabulary. Finally, we measured liquid using millilitres and litres and estimated how much liquid containers could hold. Next week, we are going to be learning all about temperature!

News from Year 3



In English, we have become inventors. Willie Wonka has asked us to design a new chocolate bar for his factory. In small groups, demonstrating Solidarity and Democracy, we generated ideas for flavours, shape, name and packaging. Of course, it had to be magical, for example, make you taller, give you confidence or give you wings. No limits to inventiveness!

In Maths, we looked at different types of lines. First recapping the steps to draw accurately measured lines using a ruler, and then we found out about, horizontal, vertical, parallel and perpendicular lines.



Year 4 Science



We have been investigating the water cycle in science. To support our learning we made a mini-biome in a plastic cup. We placed a handful of cress seeds into damp compost and then covered over the cup with cling film. The water evaporates and is caught on the cling film where the droplets increase in size until they become heavy. This is when they then fall down back to the compost for the cress to soak up once more and so the cycle continues. Much like on Earth when the rain is soaked up, evaporates and then forms clouds until it rains again.

Year 5 formal letters and chocolate potatoes!

This week we have been writing formal letters in the role of soldiers who wish to apply to the army. We have used our knowledge from our WWI topic to help us to inform of our skills and abilities, whilst trying to convince the army to let us join them in their fight.

We have also experienced baking, using a WWI recipe — using over 8kg of potatoes that were mashed and folded into chocolate to make chocolate brownies! Pupils have been looking forward to this all week and have enjoyed making and tasting their creations.



For PE, we have continued to use our striking and fielding skills in rounders. Well done to JA (5NB) and HS (5CP) for their efforts this week.

We have also been learning about forgiveness, personal identity and converting units of measurement.

Year 6

At the beginning of this week in Year 6, we have been rehearsing our year leavers play: School Daze. Most of us with speaking parts know our lines now and are perfecting our performances. We know most of the song lyrics too!

On Thursday evening, lots of us pitched our tents and camped overnight on the school field! Over the two days, we enjoyed lots of fun and games including: The 'Waterbottle and tights' game; cricket and football matches; the splash zone; craft areas; bouncy castles and more! We also enjoyed delicious food, with visits from an ice cream van, slushies and popcorn and a freshly cooked BBQ from Mr Cowland and Mrs Mylam.

We were also visited by the Cadets, where they taught us new skills like how to camouflage ourselves, how to perform first aid and we got to try some drills too.

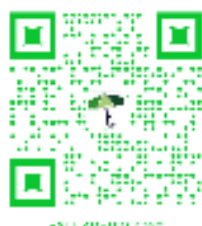

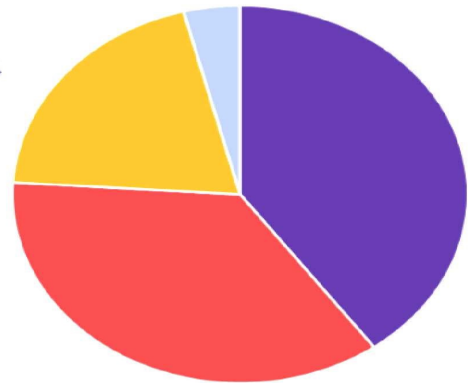

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about MINECRAFT

AGE RATING

7+

Minecraft is a beloved classic of modern gaming. First released in 2011, this open-ended 'sandbox' game of building and exploration still has over 140 million players who happily return to play it at least once every month. Minecraft has also been utilised for much more than just entertainment: it's sometimes used in schools to teach children coding, and it's also employed as a tool for computer-aided design, which is another valuable skill. Encouraging creativity and problem solving, Minecraft has plenty to offer gamers of all ages, and it's available on almost all video game platforms.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

PUBLIC SERVERS

Joining a public network (called a server) lets your child potentially interact with strangers through text chat. Some servers focus on building, while others are dedicated to role-playing – encouraging direct player interaction. Anyone can join public servers and connecting to one is relatively simple. Public server IP addresses (and therefore someone's location) are easy to find with search engines.

GRIEFING

Some people in Minecraft delight in purposefully damaging or destroying another player's creation. This is called 'griefing' and is a form of bullying: it intentionally spoils someone else's experience in the game by deleting hours of their work and forcing them to start from scratch. Many public servers treat griefing as a severe offence and frequently ban offenders.

ADDICTIVENESS

Minecraft's gameplay is relatively simple, and the outcome (when a child has built something new, for instance) can be extremely gratifying. This can make the game highly addictive. It's easy to lose track of time while playing Minecraft, causing committed young players to forget about other activities like homework or enjoying family time.

SCARY ELEMENTS

The visual design and gameplay of Minecraft is purposefully child friendly, so there's nothing too untoward in the game. However, some of the 'baddies' that can be encountered might prove a little too scary for very young players. In the game, certain enemies come out at night and are accompanied by audio – such as zombie moans and skeleton bone rattles – that may unnerve young ones.

ADDITIONAL PURCHASES

After initially buying the game, players can make optional extra purchases for cosmetic items and other bonuses. Minecraft Realms is an optional online subscription (requiring regular payments) that lets users run a multiplayer server to play with their friends. Most games consoles also need an active subscription to enable online play – so online gaming can quickly become an expensive hobby.

Advice for Parents & Carers

RESEARCH CONTENT CREATORS

There are a lots of Minecraft content creators who release helpful videos about the game on YouTube and Twitch. Not all of these, however, are suitable for children. Watching these content creators' channels yourself first is a safe way to find appropriate Minecraft videos to share with your children. This also helps you learn more about the game itself, and how your child plays it.

CHOOSE THE RIGHT MODE

Selecting 'Creative' or 'Peaceful' mode allows children to play Minecraft without having to contend with enemies. It's also a great way for you to get used to playing the game with them, since the difficulty level is lower. This allows you to work together on a long-term project, creating something special without the threat of moaning zombies or creepers damaging your build.

HOST A PRIVATE SERVER

The easiest way to find a safe server for your child to play on is to make one yourself. Hosting a server prevents strangers from finding it, unless they've been given the necessary joining details. A private server also lets you control who's allowed to enter and – if necessary – to ban someone who shouldn't be there. This is the closest equivalent to parental controls in Minecraft.

ENCOURAGE BREAKS

It's easy for the hours to fly by while your child is playing Minecraft, so reminding them to take regular breaks is essential. This is a useful way for them to learn good time management, which they'll benefit from as they get older. It will also teach them to play their favourite games in moderation – limiting addictive behaviour and allowing them to manage their day better.

TALK ABOUT STRANGERS

At some point in their lives, almost everyone needs to have contact with a stranger online. Talking to your child about online safety, therefore, is essential – as is having a plan in place for dealing with any hostile or difficult strangers. Ensure that your child knows never to tell a stranger about themselves online, and that they should come to you straight away if they do encounter a problem.

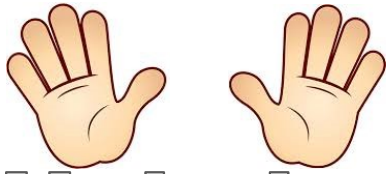

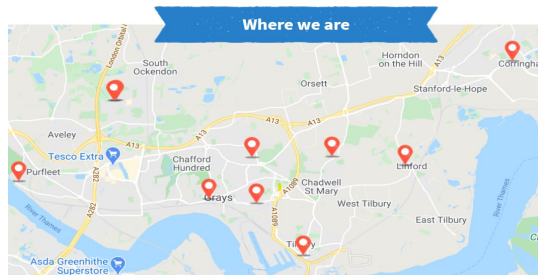
