Classoom catch up


Reception

This half term in Reception we are focussing on 'Fantasy and Adventure' where we will look and lots of different stories with magical and mythical creatures. This week we have been reading 'Supertato' by Sue Hendra. The week started off with Evil Pea writing us a letter and some vegetables being captured! We had to use our phonics to describe the vegetables in the story so he would release a new vegetable each day!

We have enjoyed exploring our new potion labs in our classroom and creating our own magical potions to safely release the carrots. We have been exploring different vegetables and using different techniques to create drawings of them.

In Maths we have been exploring 3D shapes, we have got better at identifying and naming the shapes. We have enjoyed exploring and building with the shapes.











In Maths, we have been learning about tens and ones. We discussed that one ten is equal to ten ones and that numbers from 11 to 19 are made up of one ten and extra ones. We have represented different numbers up to 20, using ten frames and base 10.















In Science, we continued our learning on our new topic, 'Animals including humans'. We found out lots of information about the different animal groups and that there are similarities and differences between them.


For example; amphibians and reptiles can both live on the land and in the water. However, amphibians lay their eggs in the water, but reptiles lay their eggs on land.

We also worked as a class to sort images of various animals into the correct groups of fish, amphibians, reptiles, birds, mammals and insects.



about the Space race. We found this very interesting and can tell you about what Scientist have done throughout the years in the development of space. We then sequenced the events on a timeline in







In Science, we have been learning about the life cycle of humans. We discussed the changes that happen and looked at the things that stay the same when humans grow.

This week we began our new class text: 'Where the Wild Things Are' by Maurice Sendak. Using our comprehension skills, we looked carefully at the book to predict what might happen as the story progresses. Next, we worked in small groups to create freeze frames of the main events and used these to secure our understanding of the characters and how they feel. To broaden our use of vocabulary, we used dictionaries to look up the meaning of interesting words used by the author such as gnashed and mischief.

In our Foundation lessons this week, we had our first Geography lesson! We had to locate the countries within the United Kingdom and he even began to identify some major cities, thinking carefully about their landmarks. In French, our topic has moved onto 'body parts'. We worked well to listen carefully and repeat the French vocabulary to learn the parts of the body, before practising using this language with a partner.



Year 4 - Music



We used an ipad app called xylo and real xylophones to either learn to play twinkle twinkle little star or create our own melody to perform to the class.




This week in Year 4, we have been focusing on Haiku poems using the Lorax, Thneedville, for context. The pupils enjoyed creating their own and illustrating their own versions of Thneedville, we were very impressed with the level of work produced and the best ones were even chosen for display! In science, we continue to learn about sound and have had practical examples for the children to understand how the vibrations in the air translate into the sounds we hear. In maths, the pupils have enjoyed lessons that have focused on the 3, 6 and 9 times tables. It has given them another opportunity to revise and establish patterns in these times tables which we encourage them to practice! Following the success of the Brain Buddies group that had worked with 4MR, from next week both 4SA and 4JP will begin weekly sessions on a Thursday in order to help the children with their mental health and encourage positive practises to help us deal with our emotions. Letters will be handed out to pupils to provide more information on these sessions.


Year 5 - Welcome Back!


Happy New Year from the Year Five Team!








In Maths this week, we have been exploring different methods of multiplication, including: area method, array, short and long multiplication and partitioning. See some of our fabulous examples below!







Year 6

In Year 6 this week we continued our foundation unit of Ancient Greece. So far we have learned about the timeline of the empire and the locations that became part of the empire as Alexander the Great's kingdom expanded. To support our learning, we are reading the book 'Who Let The Gods Out' in each class—we are

finding this book to be both engaging and informative.





In R.E. we explored the concept of morality from a non-religious point of view. We used Humanism to demonstrate a faith that places value on traits like reason and relying on science in order to explain they way things are. Some key principles of morality within Humanism are: be honest; use your mind and; treat other people the way that you would want to be treated. We then went on to create a 'Code of Living' using a set of principles or rules that would help to make the world and happier and kinder place.

Since Monday 10th January our new sandpit has been open to the children.

Due to Covid restrictions this has been done on a rota basis initially beginning with Year 1 who have loved accessing the sandpit this week!

Here are what some of our Year 1 children have said

"I like having the different toys to play with. It makes lunchtimes so much fun!"

"It helps us to be better at things like sharing."

"We got to go in the big sandpit and use spades and buckets to dig."

The children have all been informed of the rules of the sandpit to keep them safe and to create an area where they can play freely, create and imagine.

The sandpit will be checked every morning as we are aware of the potential for cats and foxes to misuse it.

In addition to this we have a large net to enclose the sandpit overnight. The net deters animals but allows rain and sunlight in to naturally refresh and cleanse the sand. This advice comes from OPAL (Outdoor Play And Learning)

Boot scrapers are also on order to help keep the sand out of the school and off of the children's shoes. However, a little bit of sand in a sock is a small price to play for any child's enjoyment

I would like to thank the numerous staff and year 6 pupils who offered and helped fill the sandpit.
