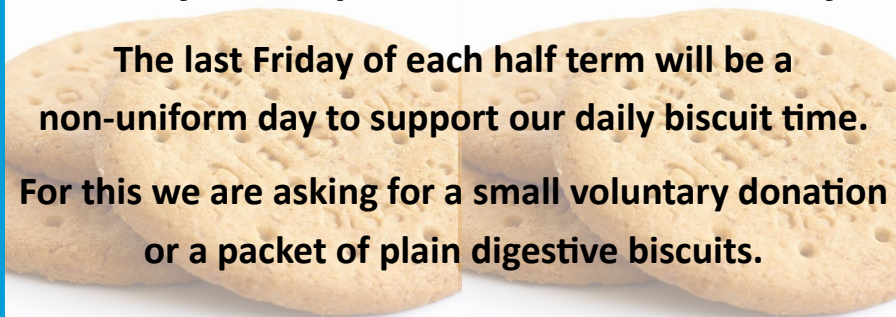



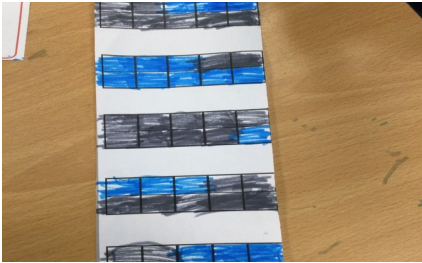
Classroom catch up

Reception

This week in Reception we have been completing different Pirate challenges and thinking carefully about what a pirate might need to sail on the seas! We practiced using different adjectives to describe the pirates and what they looked like as well as designing our own pirate outfits.

Would you like to be a pirate? We answered that question, and gave our reasons as to why we would or wouldn't like to be a pirate. Violet said no, because she would miss her mummy if she has to be away at sea all of the time! Jackson said he didn't want to be a pirate because he didn't want to fight because it hurts people. Anton said yes because he wanted to collect treasure!

In Maths we have been working on number bonds to 10 and even to 20. We have enjoyed singing the number bond rocks song to help us with our learning!



Year One

In Maths this week, we have been consolidating our knowledge of counting to 50 forwards and backwards, counting in multiples of 2s and 5s and discussing number bonds to 20. These were explored practically by using a range of concrete manipulatives, pictorial representations and by playing games. Interestingly, we learnt that multiples of 2 are even numbers and can sometimes be multiples of 10. Year 1 have really worked hard this week in readiness to build on the acquired Maths skills in the coming summer term. Well done Year 1!

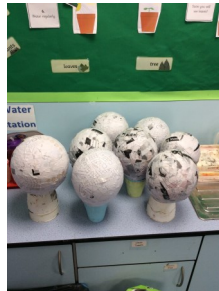




Year 2

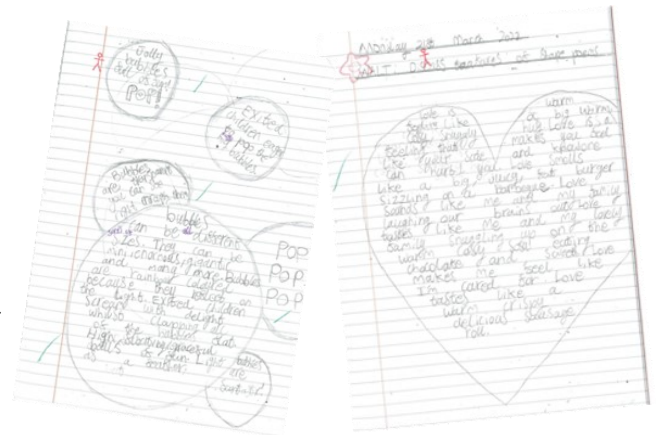

Year 3

The focus this week in English was poetry. The children explored poetic devices, such as onomatopoeia, alliteration, and rhyme, then created their own shape poems. The children really enjoyed creating their Bubble poems, with added Bubble solution for inspiration.

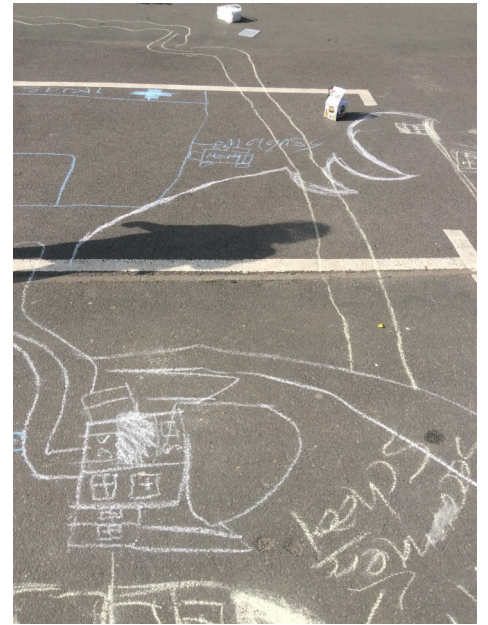


In Maths, we have been learning how to measure and calculate perimeter using 2D shapes. The have been learning that the specific properties of certain shapes, meant that it wasn't necessary to know the measurement of all sides of a shape to calculate its perimeter.

In Geography, the children continued to explore South America, focusing on the Brazilian Rainforest. The children worked in groups to create all four levels of a rainforest: forest floor, understory, canopy and emergent layer.

Year 4

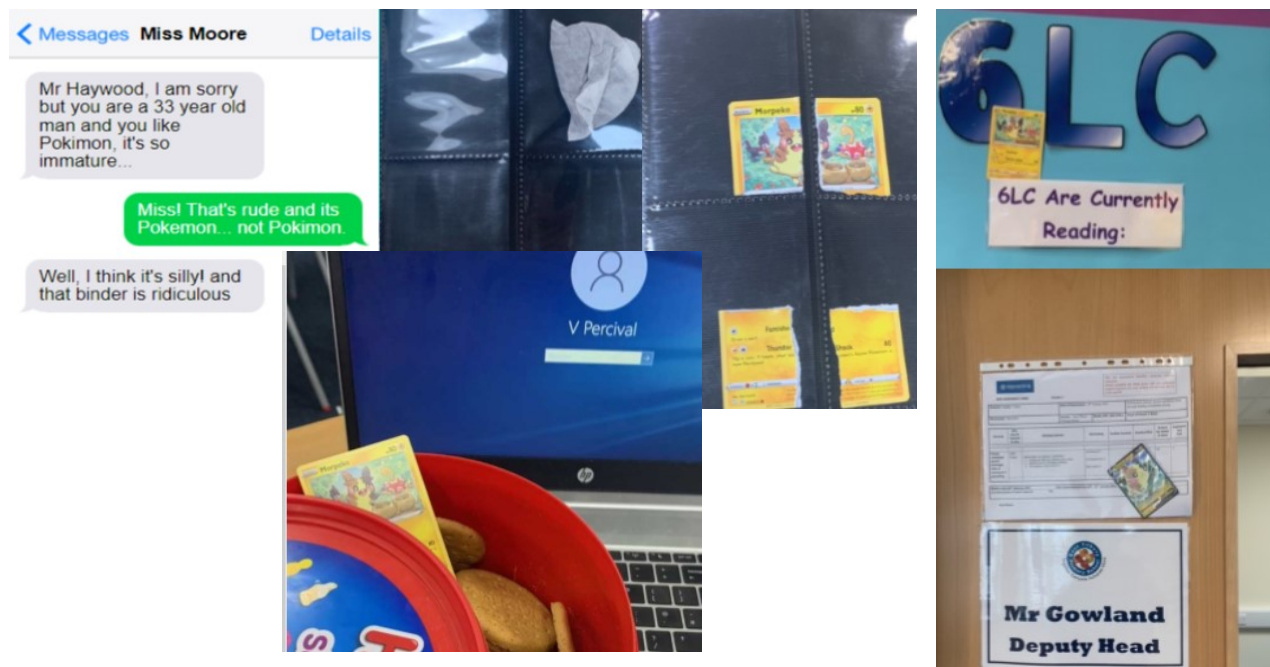
This week in year 4, we have had such a peculiar yet interesting week! Given that our rooms in the morning were used for mock SATS, we have had the pleasure of joining classes to share this unique experience together. Lessons such as reading skills and geography were engaging as the children learnt about settlements, built their own using Lego and created further designs on the playground using chalk! On Friday, we also had the pleasure of cooking and enjoying a food tasting. Pupils were able to create fruit skewers and mini pizzas. They also designed a healthy eating menu with a calorie limit of 2000 calories. The Year 4 team are very proud of how the children have adapted to the changes this week and supported one another throughout their learning. Well Done !



Fours, Sixes, Decimals and The Mystery of the Missing Morpekos!

The weather has been stunning this week, the birds are singing joyfully and the sun has been smiling down over the whole school. However, something not so joyful has happened in Year Five this week!

In English, the teachers' beloved Pokémon cards have suffered a loss! Their favourite cards (over 45 Morpekos) have gone missing... presumed stolen! Pupils came into school on Tuesday to a distraught and frustrated group of adults, who were devastated by the loss of their beloved cards. However, the pupils have been amazing investigators; they have been piecing together various parts of this puzzle by looking at some suspicious CCTV and some evidence found around school. Ask your child to tell you who they think is to blame and what their reasons are! Here's some of the disturbing evidence!



During Maths, pupils have been exploring decimal numbers and fractions; the children have been challenged to convert between both of those. By showing resilience, pupils have been able to use different strategies to achieve the desired answers and have worked exceptionally hard on some very, very tricky questions!

With the weather blessing us during PE, pupils have thoroughly enjoyed cricket this week. The children have been challenging themselves with batting and bowling skills. As a warm-up, the students were put into teams of three and they had to practise their catching and throwing skills during a time limit; each successful pass and catch was worth one point; however, if they dropped the ball, their score reset! Some of the groups made it to over one hundred accurate passes and catches without dropping the ball once! Just a quick reminder: with the improvement of the weather, you may wish to apply sun cream before school—especially during PE days. 5CP & 5NB PE—Monday afternoons and 5TH & 5BG—Wednesday afternoons.

Year 6

This week, Year 6 have been getting ready and preparing for SATs—we had a practice week! We followed the same pattern of testing that we will be following the week commencing Monday 9th May. The children showed incredible resilience and perseverance when tackling their test papers; we are very proud of them.

In history this week, we discussed Ancient Greek democracy and compared this to modern life. We learnt that democracy is a system of government, where the whole population gets to vote for representatives to stand for their area. Additionally, we found out that in Ancient Greece, only citizens could vote. Children & slaves were not considered citizens, so they could not vote. Women were citizens, but without political rights, so they could not vote. They believed all Greek men (except slaves), rich or poor, had the right to vote.

To really understand how this system worked, we created our own 'Ekklesia' and came up with some new laws, which the whole class voted on democratically.

Short Term and Working Memory

Children can be forgetful at times especially when it comes to uninteresting tasks, such as brushing their teeth. Although there is often nothing to worry about, there are other skills that your child will need as they grow older requiring effective use of their memory skills. Having good memory skills is one way for them to stay organised and remember all sorts of information without writing everything down. So how can you improve your child's memory skills? There are different and numerous approaches to help your child enhance their memory skills.

Why not give some of these games a try:

- Kim's Game – Place a number of objects on a tray (these can be general items or items of interest ie their favourite toys). Allow your child to look at the objects for a fixed period of time and then cover them over. What items can they remember?
- What's missing? Set the tray up in the game above but this time take an item away. Ask your child what item is missing. Alternatively, you can add an item. Can they tell what is different?
- Memory cards – Using a normal deck of playing cards or matching pictures, turn them face down and ask them to turn them over to find the matching pair.
- Memory bag – Place a number of objects in a bag. Pull out one object at a time and place them in front of your child. When all objects have been displayed, put them back into the bag and ask them to pull them out in the same order (they can look at the objects or use touch to identify them).
- I went to the... The first person uses the statement 'I went to the...' (you can choose a place ie supermarket/football stadium/zoo etc) . The next repeats the statement and names the first person's answer followed by their own...and so on. If you want to make the game more difficult, you can use the alphabet, starting each answer with the next letter in chronological order.



Whole School Nurture Approach

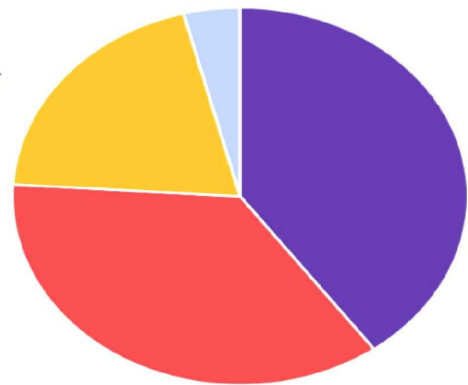

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about PHONE SCAMS

In a three-month period during 2021, no fewer than 45 million people in the UK experienced a suspicious attempt at being contacted via their mobile. Phone scams are a common form of cyber-attack where fraudsters engage directly with their intended victim through their smartphone. As our phones carry so many sensitive (and therefore potentially valuable) details about us, it's vital that trusted adults are alert to the tactics that scammers use to get access to user accounts, personal data and private information for financial gain.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

SMISHING

SMS phishing, or 'smishing' is one of the most common forms of mobile-based cyber-attack. Smishing is when a scammer texts their target, pretending to be a reputable person or organisation. They aim to trick the victim into supplying sensitive data such as bank details and personal information, so that they can then access the target's bank accounts and remove money.

IMPERSONATION

Fraudsters often impersonate someone else to trick the victim into actually transferring money directly. They might claim, for example, to be a friend or relative using a different number who urgently needs funds. Other common cons include sending fake texts informing the target that they have a package which requires a fee to be delivered, or that they have an unpaid bill to settle.

NUMBER SPOOFING

Here, the scammer takes impersonation one step further by cloning the phone number of a genuine company. So when the target receives a call or text, their phone recognises the sender's number as legitimately belonging to Amazon, HMRC, the NHS or the DVLA (who have all been impersonated in these cons). This makes the scam far harder to spot and the victim much more inclined to comply.

FAKE TECH SUPPORT

Attackers contact a target, pretending to work for their employer's IT support team. They then advise them to download some software to fix 'a technical issue' with their device. In reality, however, the software grants the scammers access to the victim's private data and sensitive information. This con is more common on desktop and laptop devices, but is still possible to accomplish on mobiles.

SIM HIJACKING

SIM hijacking switches control of a phone account from the victim's SIM card to one in the scammers' possession. Criminals use personal details pieced together from social media (birthday, address, pet's name and so on) to pose as you, then instruct your phone network to transfer your number to their SIM - giving them access to all calls and texts meant for you, including one-time login passcodes.

Advice for Parents & Carers

DO SOME DIGGING

If you've received a call or text asking for specific information, research the caller's number. There are several websites that allow you to enter a phone number and will then display any relevant information about it - this usually includes feedback and comments from other people, so you can easily see if that particular number has been implicated in potential scams.

TRY A CALL BLOCKER

If a suspicious call comes through on your mobile, you can manually block the number if you believe it to be dubious or a nuisance caller. Alternatively, you could consider installing a call blocker service on your phone. They automatically stop calls getting through from numbers which have been reported as suspicious, halting potential scammers in their tracks before they can reach you.

VERIFY THE SOURCE

Never disclose confidential details to an individual or organisation you're unfamiliar with, if the caller claims to represent a company you trust but is still asking for personal information or payment on an outstanding charge, end the conversation. Then find the company's genuine number on a bill or on their website and call them directly to confirm if there really is an issue you need to address.

BREAK OUT THE TECH

Lots of anti-virus software now also protects mobiles. Some anti-virus apps can detect phishing links in text messages and alert you to the risk. When you're out and about, try not to use public WiFi for sensitive transactions: it's far less secure than your home WiFi network. Instead, you could consider installing a VPN (virtual private network), which encrypts all data travelling to and from your phone.

REPORT INCIDENTS

If you or a family member does give out confidential information to a caller you aren't sure about, contact the actual company mentioned to check if the call was genuine. If they confirm that the call was not made by their organisation, you should report it as a potential scam via the Action Fraud website and (depending on exactly what information was divulged) consider involving the police.

BE WARY OF LINKS

If you get a message from an unknown number asking you to click on a link, report it as spam and do not open the link. One recent example 'warned' victims they'd been exposed to the Omicron variant and needed to click a link to buy a special test - only to find they had paid their money to scammers. Links can also install malware onto your device, so always treat them with extreme caution.

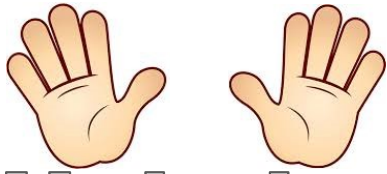
- Depending on the subject you wish to teach and whether you meet the eligibility criteria, you may be eligible to receive a tax-free ITT training bursary from the DfE.

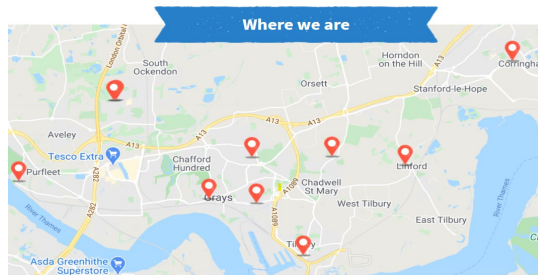
