

Classoom catch up

Reception

This week in Reception we have been learning about the book 'Pirates Love Underpants' by Claire Freedman. We have been designing our own treasure maps and islands to write about.

In maths we have been looking at subsidising numbers to 5. We can now look at different arrangements of numbers and recognise how many there are without counting them!

On Thursday we celebrated World Book Day and we dressed up as our favourite book characters. Then we did book activities all day. We drew pictures from our favourite story and we shared our favourite books with our friends. On the carpet we got to tell everybody who we were dressed up as and what book we were from.

In Maths this week, Year I have been focusing on measurements. We have been learning to compare length and height, measure length using a ruler and using non-standard units. We have been having lot of fun using everyday objects to understand and compare length and height. We have been able to use the words long, longer, short, shorter, tall, taller to compare the object.





Year 2

This week we have been making rhythms. We first discussed what syllables were and clapped the syllables in our name. After that, we selected space words and made a sequence with them. Finley we created a rhythm by clapping the syllables of the space

In Art, we have continued looked at the artist Peter Thorpe. We looked at the abstract background and created our own using tissue paper. We focused on layering the paper to create a textured





In Maths, we have continued to develop our understanding of shape. We have been sorting the shapes into different properties.



In English this week, we are applying our knowledge of biographies. Using the information gathered last week, the children started to write their David Attenborough biographies, organising the information into paragraphs.

In Maths, we have been learning how to organise data. Building on our knowledge of Tally Charts and Pictograms, the children have been learning how to present data in a bar graph and solving problems using data presented in a table.

In Science, we have been learning about seed dispersal. Plants have a variety of tricks to ensure that seeds are dispersed and do not fall to the ground directly under the parent plant. Did you know seeds can be grouped into Flyers, Clingers, Tasty Treats or Pepper Pots? We all went on a seed hunt around the school to find examples of the different types of seeds.







World Book Day

On Thursday we celebrated World Book Day! The children looked amazing dressed up as their favourite characters. Lots of activities were planned, including an online masterclass with the authors of 'Rocket Rules' Nathan Bryon and Dapo Adeola. They discussed how important it is to think about what you are grateful for each day, to encourage a positive mindset. The children created posters of gratitude, which we made into a class book.









Year 4 - Creativity

This week in year 4, we have been getting our creative hats on! We created mood boards for our chosen scene from Alice in Wonderland. We could use any materials or media and tried to encompass the emotions and thoughts involved in the scene.



For world book day this week, the teachers dressed up as characters from Alice in Wonderland to inspire the children for their model boxes. Carefully, we chose our scenes, created mood boards and today we started to bring our plans to life!

In Science, we have been focusing on electricity and the children had the opportunity to create a simple circuit and learn the symbols.






Year 6

Short Term and Working Memory

Children can be forgetful at times especially when it comes to uninteresting tasks, such as brushing their teeth. Although there is often nothing to worry about, there are other skills that your child will need as they grow older requiring effective use of their memory skills. Having good memory skills is one way for them to stay organised and remember all sorts of information without writing everything down. So how can you improve your child's memory skills? There are different and numerous approaches to help your child enhance their memory skills.

Why not give some of these games a try:

• Kim's Game – Place a number of objects on a tray (these can be general items or items of interest ie their favourite toys). Allow your child to look at the objects for a fixed period of time and then cover them over. What items can they remember?

- What's missing? Set the tray up in the game above but this time take an item away. Ask your child what item is missing. Alternatively, you can add an item. Can they tell what is different?
- Memory cards Using a normal deck of playing cards or matching pictures, turn them face down
 and ask them to turn them over to find the matching pair.
- Memory bag Place a number of objects in a bag. Pull out one object
 at a time and place them in front of your child. When all objects have
 been displayed, put them back into the bag and ask them to pull them
 out in the same order (they can look at the objects or use touch to identify them).
- I went to the... The first person uses the statement 'I went to the...' (you can choose a place ie supermarket/football stadium/zoo etc). The next repeats the statement and names the first person's answer followed by their own...and so on. If you want to make the game more difficult, you can use the alphabet, starting each answer with the next letter in chronological order.



World Book Day is a great reminder that stories can be used to support children's social and emotional development.

The Rainbow Fish is a great story all about the importance of sharing and thinking of others. It is a story that many of our classes have used in their daily biscuit session to work together on this important skill.



What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

WhatsApp is the world's most popular messaging service, with around two billion users exchanging texts, photos, videos and documents, as well as making voice and video calls. Its end-to-end encryption means messages can only be viewed by the sender and any recipients; not even WhatsApp can read them. Updates to its privacy policy in 2021 (involving sharing data with parent company Facebook) caused millions to leave the app, but the new policy was widely misinterpreted — it only related to WhatsApp's business features, not to personal messages.

CREATE A SAFE PROFILE

Even though someone would need a child's phone number to add them as a contact, it's also worth altering a young person's profile settings to restrict who can see their photo and status. The options are 'everyone', 'my contacts' and 'nobody' - choosing one of the latter two ensures that your child's profile is better protected.



EXPLAIN ABOUT BLOCKING 🕬

If your child receives spam or offensive messages, calls or files from a contact, they should block them using 'settings' in the chat. Communication from a blocked contact won't show up on their device and stays undelivered Blocking someone does not remove them from your child's contact list – so they also need to be deleted from the address book.

REPORT POTENTIAL SCAMS

Young people shouldn't engage with any message that looks suspicious or too good to be true. When your child receives a message from an unknown number for the first time, they'il be given the option to report it as spam. If the sender claims to be a friend or relative, call that person on their usual number to verify it really is them, or if it's someone trying to trick your child.

LEAVE A GROUP

If your child is in a group chat that is making them feel uncomfortable, or has been added to a group that they don't want to be part of, they can use WhatsApp's group settings to leave. If someone exits a group, the admin can add them back in once; if they leave a second time, it is permanent.

THINK ABOUT LOCATION

If your child needs to use the 'live location' function to show you or one of their friends where they are, advise them to share their location only for as long as they need to. WhatsApp gives a range of 'live location' options, and your child should manually stop sharing their position as soon as it is no longer needed.

YouTube is a video sharing site/application that enables you to upload, view, rate, share and comment on a wide variety of videos. Consisting of a huge resource of information, advice and entertainment, YouTube now has 1.9 billion logged-in monthly users who watch a billion hours of video daily. Most of the content on Google-owned YouTube is uploaded by individuals, but organisations and media companies also offer some of their content via this platform.

YouTube Premium (formerly YouTube Red) is a
new paid streaming subscription service in the
UK, offering a three-month free trial to tempt
viewers into a £12-per-month plan. This includes the ability to
download videos, stream videos with the app in the
background, gives exclusive access to original content and a
separate music streaming service and gaming app.

DANGEROUS 'CHALLENGE'
& VIRAL VIDEOS

On YouTube, 'challenge videos' are shared quickly and can be very dangerous. One person may post a video of themselves doing something unusual like eating a hot chill ior jumping in a river and before you know it, the video goes viral and everyone wants to join in and share their videos. The speed in which challenge videos spread across the Internet makes it difficult to keep up with the latest ones.

SHARING VIDEOS

SHAKING VIDEOS

As well as watching videos, many children are keen to share their own videos online, emulating their YouTube heroes, such as Stampy or DanTDM. However, if they post something on YouTube, they may later regret it or feel embarrassed about what they have shared. There is also a risk that they will receive hurtful or negative comments regarding not only their content, but also their appearance. YouTube's comment section is infamous for being one of the most opinionated on the Internet.

IN-APP MESSAGING
When your child is logged into their Google account and browsing the YouTube website, they can share and talk about videos with their friends using the chat bubble. This can be found at the top right of the desktop site or through in-app messaging on their mobile or tablet. When they tap on the 'Friends' icon, they have a list of suggested people from their contacts - which can be any contact they've had on Google or somebody who has sent them an invite link.

AGE-INAPPROPRIATE VIDEOS

AGE-INAPPROPRIATE VIDEOS

As YouTube is the biggest video sharing website in the world, there is content available for all ages, meaning that some content will not be appropriate for your child. If you think that content is unsuitable, there is a flagging feature to submit if for review by YouTube staff, but you will need to be aware that just because video is not appropriate for a younger audience, it may not violate YouTube's policies. YouTube has mechanisms in place to automatically remove explicit and harmful content, yet offensive content may still slip through.

TURN ON 'RESTRICTED' MODE

'Restricted Mode' is an optional setting you can use to help screen out potentially mature content you may prefer your child not to see. Restricted Mode works on the browser or device level, so must be turned on for each browser or device your child uses. To do this, follow these steps:

- Desktop:
 Go to the bottom of any YouTube page and switch 'Restricted Mode' to 'ON'.
 To make it more difficult for this to be turned off, you will be given the
- you will be given the option to lock restricted mode onto your browser

Mobile:

- · Tap the three vertical lap the three vertical dots at the top-right on the screen and press, 'Settings.'
 Click on 'Restricted mode filtering.'
 Press 'Restrict.'

Please note that you can't 'lock' restricted mode on a phone in the same way that you can on a desktop. You will need to turn this on each time your child uses it.

CREATE A FAMILY GOOGLE ACCOUNT

By having a shared family Google account, checking the history will enable you to see exactly what your child is watching and sharing on YouTube. To see the history on a computer, on the right hand menu under the library section, click 'History' On mobiles, the viewing history can be found by clicking on the 'Library' tab.

When using YouTube, there may be instances where your child difficult time, here's how to block them and prevent future comments and replies:

Go to their channel/account by clicking on their name.

Click on 'About'.

MONITOR WHAT YOUR CHILD IS
WATCHING/POSTING
The only way to truly know what your child may have been watching is to regularly monitor them. You can do this by checking their viewing history, YouTube videos can also be easily downloaded, so it is important that your child understands the associated dangers of content they are uploading and that it could harm their online reputation in the future. Show them how to set their videos to private or choose a small network of YouTubers to share with. To get started, your child can use YouTube Studio which offers learning modules on creating a YouTube channel, however, you should encourage them not to use their real name.

NEW FEATURES

YouTube has launched a tool called 'Time Watched' that allows you to see how long has been spent on the platform. Once you have discovered how much time has been spent on the app, there is the option to set a time limit. Once the limit is reached, a reminder will pop up on the screen. You can also disable sounds and vibrations to belee sounds and vibrations to belee the control of the control

OPT FOR A FAMILY PREMIUM PLAN
A YouTube family Premium plan may be a cost-effective option if you have more than one child. For £17.99 a month, it allows you to share a YouTube paid membership with up to five other family members - aged 13 and older - living in the same household. As the account holder, or family manager, you must reserve a Google family account. you must create a Google family account

MANAGING IN-APP MESSAGES

If your child is accessing YouTube via your account, bear in mind that they may be contacted by Google contacts who are complete strangers to them. You can remove someone from the suggested contacts list by pressing and holding the person's name and tapping on the red 'x.'

POPULAR YOUTUBE GAMERS

POPULAR YOUTUBE GAMERS

There are hundreds of YouTube accounts which show other people playing and commenting on games. These are called 'Let's Play' videos. While YouTube can be a great resource for hints, tips and news for games, it is a good idea for parents to keep a close eye on what YouTuber's are posting. Often, the games they are playing will contain strong language and violence. A few examples of popular YouTube gamers for you to have a look at are:
