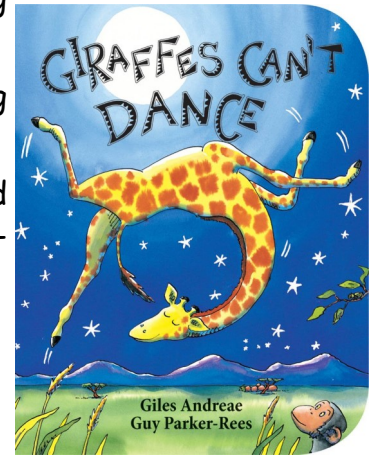
Classroom catch up

Reception

This week in Reception we have been reading the story *Giraffes Can't Dance* written by Giles Andreae and Guy Parker-Reece. The story is about a giraffe that can't dance. It made us think about the things that we are good at— running, jumping, being a good friend and tidying up. We wrote sentences using a capital letter at the beginning, finger spaces and a full stop at the end. We are getting better at remembering all the sentence rules.

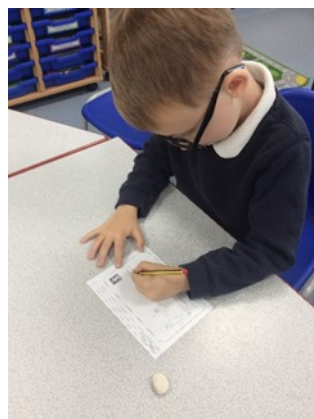
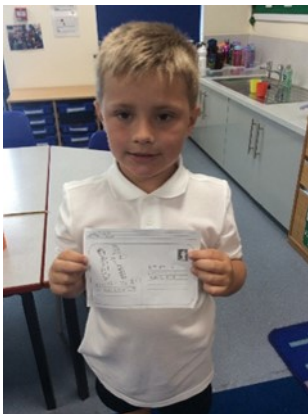
In maths we have been consolidating our learning about doubling numbers and counting in twos. We are so good at this now.

We were super excited to visit our new Year One teachers and find out where our new classrooms are, we showed courage, determination and solidarity.



Year One

This week Year One have been looking at letters. They understood that a letter is a message from one person to another and that there are many features that need to be included in a letter. For example, a letter cannot be sent without an address and letters usually include the date, the recipient and who the letter is from. Year 1 then had a go at writing their own letters and a post card for their new teachers explaining what they are looking forward to about going into Year Two.





Year 2

In science we have been exploring the waterproof properties of wax. A first, we looked at what waterproof means and wrote a list of different materials that are waterproof. After we investigated what happened when you pour water onto a piece of paper that has been coloured in using a crayon. We then used a white wax crayon to write a message, our partners then used water colour paint to reveal the message.



In computing we have been learning how to program. This week we designed our very own program, this meant that we had to think carefully about the outcome we wanted. We had to consider which sprite (character) would be best suited to which background. Once we had thought about and designed our programs (onto paper), we created them on Scratch Jnr—programming software for children. We really enjoyed making our programs, our teachers were very impressed with them!



On Wednesday, we had a very exciting morning and met our new year 3 teachers! We had a fun morning sharing a little bit about ourselves with our new teachers. They also shared some information about them. After, we learned more about the topics and expectations in year 3. We came back into our classrooms very excited about our new teachers and starting year 3.

Year 3

This week we have been learning about formal letter writing in English. We had to both plan and write a very important letter to Mr. Wonka to convince him to employ us as part of his team of inventors. As part of our letters, we had to persuade Mr. Wonka that our delicious creations were superior to others.

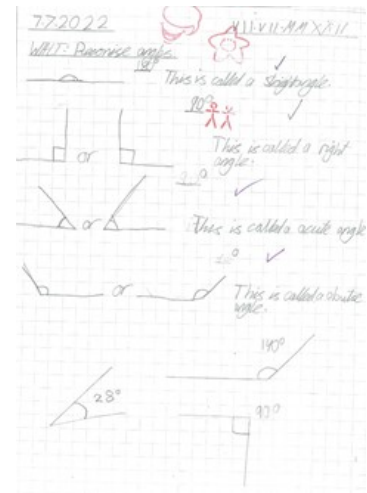
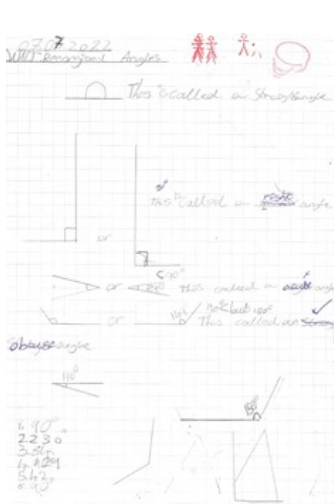
In maths, we were introduced to our new topic: measuring mass. We had to look carefully at various scales and noticed the difference within the intervals of all. Using our division skills, we were able to work out the increasing intervals to be able to read the measurements with accuracy.

In music, we consolidated our understanding of body percussion and followed instructions well to create our own musical rhythm for 'Just can't wait to be King' from the Lion King. We had great fun using our bodies as instruments.



Year 4 Maths

Many pupils embraced the chance to experiment with using protractors for the first time. We have learnt to recognise degrees as a way of measuring the angle where two lines meet. We have explored the labels acute, right, obtuse and straight as a way of categorising different illustrations and begun to measure these with some accuracy.



Dear Future Teacher and Equations

During this week, we have been working very hard. In English, we have been looking at formal and informal letter writing and pupils have been writing a formal letter to their future teacher. Speaking of future teachers, we have all met our new class teachers this week and; we all took part in a transition morning with our new classes and the children—most of them—seemed happy about who their Y6 teacher would be.

In maths, we have been looking at balancing equations and how we can represent missing values with algebraic expressions. Pupils have been exploring different way to solve problems with missing values—some had pictures, some had letters and others had symbols, which represented our missing value.

In science, we have reached the end of our topic about the life cycle of humans. We were looking at what changes happen to humans throughout their lives and the different stages of the human life cycle.

PE—all of the classes took part in rounders matches this week. The NB vs. CP match ended 15: 15.5, there was half a rounder in that game and the BG vs. TH match finished 16:18, another close match, well done to all those who took.

Year 6

This week most of the Y6 pupils have been on transition at their secondary schools and some are doing their transition in the next two weeks. This year we have pupils going to several different secondary schools.



The majority of pupils are going to St Clere's so are on transition from Wednesday to Friday, so we spent Monday and Tuesday rehearsing our Leavers' Play and doing PE.

The pupils who were with us on Wednesday helped Mrs Russo with Y1 and Y2 cross-country trials and had great fun creating their own version of cricket with Mrs Garbo-Miller.

On Thursday and Friday we spent time playing a very entertaining and highly tactical game: 'The Pirate Game.' This is great fun and can be played by people of all ages. Why not try the game at home?

On Thursday, our Y6 cricket team competed in the Essex cricket tournament at Billericay Cricket Club.

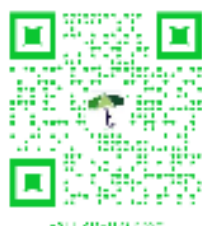

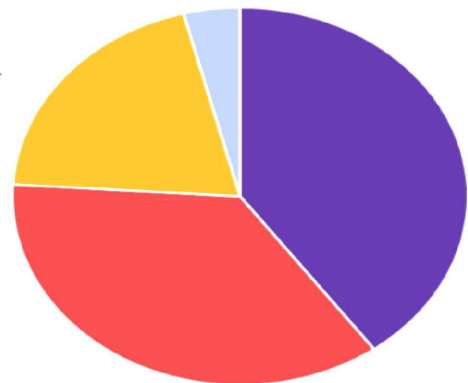

What Parents & Carers Need to Know about

GAME SALE

STEAM

Steam is a computer gaming digital distribution platform and storefront. It is the biggest platform for desktop- or laptop- based gaming, with a range of more than 30,000 games available. The platform has become a lively social environment for many gamers, and allows people to trade, sell and buy gaming items for real money. Valve, the developers behind Steam, have also released different hardware that works with the platform, including the Steam Deck – a hand-held console that lets users play their favourite games while away from their computer.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

UNSUITABLE GAMES

Among the 30,000+ games on the platform, there are many that aren't appropriate for children. Individuals can view and download games featuring adult content if they verify their age – but, of course, it's easy to enter a false date of birth online. This can lead to children and young people finding games that they shouldn't have access to: featuring violence or profanity, for example.

SPENDING SPREES

Steam hosts regular sales – including some where game prices are reduced by up to 90%. Some sales promotions also include a mini-game or event which encourages users to spend more money. The sales can be an excellent time for young gamers to purchase the titles they've been wanting, but the attractive discounts can also promote impulse buys driven by the fear of missing out.

CONTACT WITH STRANGERS

Steam isn't a social media site, but it certainly shares some of their elements. Users can add other people as 'Friends', for example (whether they know them in real life or not), and then communicate privately with them using text or voice chat. The platform also hosts public discussions and groups for socialising. Steam users can also leave comments on the profiles of other players.

POTENTIAL SCAMS

Sadly, Steam's immense popularity has made it a lucrative destination for internet scammers. The most common ruse is phishing: scammers send links to other users, aiming to trick them into entering their login details – which are then stolen. Once in control of the account, the scammer sends messages to everyone on the victim's friend's list, in an attempt to hijack their accounts too.

SHADY TRADERS

The Steam Community Market is a built-in trading area where players can trade resources for their games on the platform. Gamers can exchange items, or buy and sell them using real-world currency. It's possible for unscrupulous users to be scammed through bad trade deals, and Steam doesn't usually get involved when this happens. There are also third-party trading websites, which can be risky to use.

SPARSE AGE RATINGS

Steam is a digital distribution platform for games of all kinds, including ones not rated by regulatory bodies. Getting a game rated takes a long time, and can be expensive, so developers only tend to follow that process when releasing a title that will be physically sold in shops. Most games on Steam, therefore, don't have an advisory age rating on the store page.

Advice for Parents & Carers

ENABLE PARENTAL CONTROLS

Steam does have some limited parental controls that can restrict exactly what games someone's account can view and access. This can be set up by navigating to the 'Family' tab in 'Settings', then selecting 'Manage Family View'. The platform then allows parents and carers to share a Steam account with their child and limit them to age-appropriate games.

USE GIFT CARDS

Having payment methods (like card details or PayPal) linked to a Steam account makes it very easy for a child to purchase new games or spend money on items in the marketplace. An excellent and safe alternative would be to buy a Steam gift card and let your child make their purchases with that instead – putting a manageable cap on how much they can spend on the platform.

APPLY STEAM GUARD

Steam Guard is an optional additional layer of security that protects accounts. Enabling it ensures that anyone attempting to log in to that account also needs to provide authorisation via their phone or email. The computer that your child uses Steam on can be authorised to prevent having to provide separate authentication for each login.

SHARE A LIBRARY

Using Family Library Sharing lets everyone at home share games across accounts (while still keeping their accounts separate). The entire game library from each account is shared with the other account holders – a great way to avoid having to purchase a different copy of the game for each of your children. However, if two users want to play the same game separately, you would need to buy it twice.

SAFE MODDING

Modifying a game to customise it or to introduce new content – known as 'modding' – is common on Steam. There's nothing inherently bad about modding, but installing the wrong mods can be disastrous: they can stop games from working properly, or at all. Steam's mods are unlikely to contain viruses or malware, but it's still possible – so ensure your child reads the mod's reviews first to avoid anything dangerous.

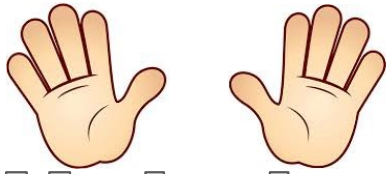

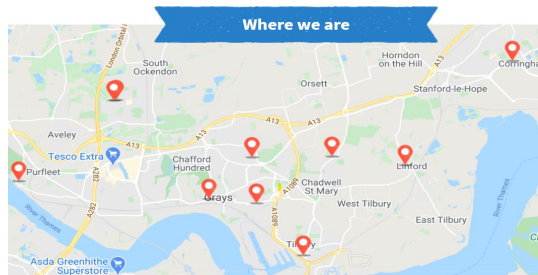
