Overview

Over the spring term, Year 3 will be focusing their learning around The Romans. This provides an exciting opportunity for our students to delve into the fascinating history of this ancient civilisation and its impact on the development of the world.

As a school, we follow The Write Stuff scheme for our English lessons. Our scheme has allowed us to structure our teaching around specific techniques that are proven to improve children's writing skills. This half term, we will be focusing our learning on creating compelling narratives, which will allow the children to develop characters and create engaging settings. Additionally, we recommend providing your child with opportunities to engage in independent writing at home. Encouraging them to write their narratives based on their own ideas and experiences will reinforce the techniques taught in school and help to build their confidence as independent writers.

As well as following The Write Stuff, we also follow the White Rose Maths scheme, which has an emphasis on the mastery approach. This approach encourages students to build a comprehensive understanding of mathematical concepts by exploring them in depth, rather than simply moving on to new topics. This term, the children will be taught about multiplication and division, mass and capacity, measurement and fractions.

The foundation topic we will be exploring is the historical interpretation of the Romans. This will involve the use and comparison of a range of sources to find out about the period. We will encourage students to observe small details in artefacts and pictures, and to identify and give reasons for different ways in which the past is represented. We will focus on key areas such as the invasion of Julius Caesar, the Roman army, British resistance under individuals like Boudica, and the Romanisation of Britain, including art, dress, language, engineering, and the Roman legacy.

Throughout this term in science lessons, the children will embark on an exciting journey to understand the fundamental principles of nutrition, anatomy, and physiology through our topic of 'Animals, including humans'. They will learn to identify that animals, including humans, need the right types and amount of nutrition, and that they cannot make their own food at nutrition from what they eat identify that humans and some other animals have skeletons and muscles for support, protection and movement. In addition, we will also be studying 'light'. The children will recognise that they need light in order to see things and that dark is the absence of light; notice that light is reflected from surfaces; recognise that light from the sun can be dangerous and that there are ways

to protect their eyes recognise that shadows are formed when the light from a light source is blocked by an opaque object.

In creative lessons, our area of study will involve significant elements of planning and thinking through the making process to create 3D forms. This will include shaping materials for a purpose, as well as positioning and joining materials in new and innovative ways such as tying, slotting, sticking, folding, and using tabs to construct 3D forms. Our use of sketchbooks will be introduced as an integral part of the problem-solving process. The children will be encouraged to use their sketchbooks to plan, record ideas, identify solutions to challenges they encounter, and make changes to improve their work. This approach will promote a reflective and evaluative mindset, fostering creativity and allowing for refinement and improvement of their artistic development.

Home learning

Home learning tasks will be set weekly on a Friday and due in the following Friday. Tasks set will be based around the children's current learning or will be challenging pre-learning tasks for the week ahead. Whilst we teach spelling instruction within school, it is expected that children are also learning their weekly spellings and practising their allocated times tables. Reading should be completed at least 5 times a week and recorded in their reading diaries.

Things you can do to support your child at home

To support your child at home, it is vital that you read with them as often as you can. To complement our in-classroom teaching, we encourage you to support your child's writing development at home. Reading together regularly and facilitating discussions about the narrative structure of stories can greatly aid their understanding and application of the skills they are learning at school.

The children should be able to complete the spelling and maths tasks independently, but may need support in reading the questions. It is a good thing if they make mistakes. This will identify to class teachers where the children need support when they are in school. By all means support them but let the children do the home learning and let them make mistakes!
