Overview

The learning in Year 5 this term will be based around the World War 1, with links made to the desert and what life is like in such climates. In English, pupils will focus on narrative and script writing for a speech. As a school, we follow the White Rose scheme of work in Maths. This half term, pupils will be taught about decimals, properties of shape, position & direction, and measurement – converting units. During foundation lessons – usually in the afternoons – students will be learning about World War 1 through the following subjects: Art, History and Design Technology. Children will also look at 'Tolerance of Others' and 'Democracy' during British Values sessions.

Computing this term will involve creating and using vector graphics and programming. During RE this term, our focus will be firstly on Jesus, with us then moving on to how religions care for and have links to the natural world. PSHE deals with 'physical and mental health', 'growing and changing', and 'keeping safe'. Our PE focus for Summer Term will be athletics, striking and fielding (cricket or rounders).

Home learning

Home learning tasks will be set weekly on a Friday and are due back on Thursday. Tasks will be shared online via Google Classroom and paper copies will be handed out. Maths is now set via Google Classroom but is based on MyMaths. Tasks set will be based on the children's current learning or will be pre-learning tasks for the week ahead. Reading should be completed at least 5 times a week and recorded in their reading diaries.

Things you can do to support your child at home

To support your child at home, it is vital that you read with them as often as you can. Reading with your child exposes them to a greater range of vocabulary and therefore supports their learning in all other areas.

The children should be able to complete the spelling patterns and maths tasks independently but may need support in reading the questions. It is a good thing if they make mistakes. This will identify to class teachers where the children need support when they are in school. By all means support them but let the children do the home learning and let them make mistakes!
